points to that the candidate will be occupied actively right up to the last. After the Youngstown meeting, Mr. Taft will leave at once for Cincinnati to cast his vote the following day. The details of the itinerary of the candidate, before he closes his western tour in Chicago Wednesday night, have not been finally worked out, but will be completed, it is said, this week.

A BUSY SUNDAY.

Candidate Taft had an exceedingly hard time to carry out what he desired and had planned a program of rest today. He reached the city at 7 o'clock this member from The city at 7 o'clock today. He reached the city at 7 o'clock this morning from Topeka and was met by a local welcoming committee, con-sisting of Senator William Warner, Representative E. C. Ellis and State Chairman W. S. Dickey. They escorted him to the Baltimore hotel, where a private breakfast party occupied an hour or more, and demands of local pol-iticians for "just a handshake" con-sumed the time until the church hour. With Mr. Ellis, the candidate attended services at the Beacon Hill Congrega-tional church and from there lunched at the residence of Mr. Dickey. An automobile ride over the numer-ous boulevards of which Kansas City is proud was taken, after which the real work of the day began for the tired campaigner. Mr. Taft had some time ago consented to talk of the work of the Y. M. C. A. to an audience of men at the Independence Avenue Meth-odist Episcopal chudch. The audience completely filled the church, and the crowd outside which demanded admis-sion was twice the number of that in-side. Windows in the edifice were broken, so great was the eageness of broken, so great was the eagerness of the crowd to get a glimpse of the can-didate, and it was only after it had been announced that Mr. Taft would address the overflow meeting that the inside meeting was allowed to proceed in quiet. in quiet. Mr. Taft delivered the same speech

Mr. Taft delivered the same speech he made last Sunday to a similar audi-ence in St. Paul. He gave his strong-est endorsement to the work the asso-ciation is doing, particularly in the Philippine Islands, the orient and in Panama, to say nothing of the work in this country. He recalled that he had participated in dedication coremonies over a number of Y. M. C. A. buildings in the past few years, and had given the work all the encouragement of which he was capable. His speech was received with interest and enthusiasm. He made no reference in any manner to polities. to politics.

What Mr. Taft said moved the audi-ence to great enthusiasm, and the speakers of the race who followed him made no pretense of concealing their political sentiments. The candidate was roundly cheered when he left the meet-ing, which continued with speeches strongly endorsing him politically. It was dusk when the candidate found himself in his rooms at the hotel, when orders were issued to give him the utmost quiet possible. Mr. Taft ad-mitted that he feit greatly fatigued with the work of the trip, but expressed the bellef that a long night's rest would put him in trim for the work in Mis-souri, which is to begin early tomor-row.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 5.—Determined to carry out their avowed intention to defeat the ordinance of the city which prescribes certain districts in which open-air meetings may be held, and forbids them in all other places, all the members of the Salvation Army of this dive to the humber of even 30 per The members of the Salvation Army of this city, to the number of over 30, per-mitted themselves to be arrested last night and hauled to the police station in police vans, singing and praying as they were hurried down the down-town streets. At police station \$25 was demanded in each instance as built and come of

in each instance as bail, and some of the members promptly deposited the sum. However, over half of the num-ber, 12 women among them, determined

ber, 12 women arryrs to the cause, and spent the night in the jail. Altogether over 50 arrests of Salva-tionists have been made during the past week, all of them being charged with violating the public meeting ordinance.

The ordinance was originally intend ed to prevent the holding of street meetings by individuals with anarchis-tic tendenciese on the down-town streets.
