

CIVIC OFFICERS OF STATE TO MEET

Second Annual Session Will Be Held at Nephi, November 21 and 22.

INCLUDES OFFICIALS-ELECT.

Purpose of Gathering is for Betterment of Municipalities of Utah—The Program.

The second meeting of the State League of Municipalities of Utah, will be held at Nephi, Juab county, on Thursday and Friday, Nov. 21 and 22, and will be attended by the mayors of nearly every city in the state. The purpose of the meeting is to further the interests of good municipal government, and not only present mayors, but city-officers-elect, are urged to be present.

An invitation extended to the civic officers throughout the state is signed by E. W. Robinson, mayor of Logan, Frank M. Conroy, mayor of Ogden, first and J. H. Friday, mayor of Provo, second vice presidents, and Thomas McMaster, secretary, and the object of the gathering is set forth as follows:

OBJECTS OF MEETING.

"The League extends to you an invitation to be present. It is not to be a meeting of mayors only, but of all city officers and citizens interested in civic affairs."

"The date of the meeting is fixed at a time when it is hoped that both present incumbents in office and officers-elect will be in attendance."

"An intelligent discussion of the subjects of civic interest will certainly prove helpful to all who have the responsibilities of city government resting upon them. The states that have such juntas operating within them are the states whose cities stand foremost in public improvement and sanitary conditions."

"The officers of Nephi will entertain the learners."

"Arrangements are being made for reduced rates at all railroads. We hope that the slight expense occasioned by the absence of every city attending this convention could be legitimately met by the cities represented, for the benefit derived from contact with experts and men of experience would exceed the slight cost to the cities. We therefore solicit your co-operation in this move for improved civic conditions and a fairer state."

Rev. Dr. Louis S. Fuller to Effect Organization in Utah.

Rev. Dr. Louis S. Fuller, state organizer for the American Anti-saloon League, who speaks at the First M. E. church Sunday night, reports this movement as being received in Utah with much enthusiasm, and that a fine state organization will obtain.

The report of the sanitary inspector showed the following results:

The use of cashiers' checks is to be adopted by the Salt Lake banks to make up for the scarcity of currency, and those checks can be used locally for any purpose that metal currency is used for. This action taken by the banks through the clearing house, coincides with similar action taken by the country banks of the United States, outside of the United States, is only \$2,000,000,000, and of this amount 20 per cent or more is held in cashiers' checks or current credits—that is, credit currency—and yet while the United States has three-quarters of the banking power of the world, it has only one-quarter of the currency. Although the four-sevenths of the world's banking power has the advantage of \$4,000,000,000 current credits of credit currency. On the same basis we are entitled to have \$2,000,000,000 of currency credit or credit currency."
