KILLING AND ALMOST LYNCHING

Patrol Driver Jackson of Butte Killed Harry Cole While Trying to Escape.

MAN'S BROTHERS LEAD A MOB.

Made an Ineffectual Attempt to Lynch Detective McGarvey Under Impression it Was He Who Did Shooting.

Mont., May 10 .- Patrol Butte, Driver Charles Jackson tonight shot and killed Harry Cole, while the latte was attempting to escape, and an incensed mob of 5,000, fed by brothers of Cole, made an ineffectual attempt to lynch Detective Charles McGarvey, the crowd laboring under the impression that it was that officer who had done the shootnig. Cole had been arrested by McGarvey on a forgery charge and was suspected of being one of the two bandits who, several days ago, held up the North Coast limited on the Western Pacific, at Wolch Spur, murdering Engineer Frank Clow and wounding Fireman Thomas Sullivan. Cole is a brother of George Cole, who is now serving a sentence in the Deer Lodge penitentiary for the robbery of the Burlington Flyer, near this city, two years ago. George Cole confessed to holding

While he was being sweated in the office of the police, Cole, it is stated, dedauity said that he knew all about the holdup of the limited, and made a dash for the door, which he reached, and ran down an alley leading from the police station. An officer started for Cole, but iripped over the threached and the floor. McGarvey followed and tripped over the prostrate form of the floor. Patrol Driver Jackson, who at this point had entered the room, upon hear-ing the commotion, saw that Cole was about to make his eacape, quickly drew his revolver and fired once, hitling the floeting man in the back and killing him almost in his tracks. An immense crowd immediately gathered, and the impression galating ground that McGarvey very had killed an innocent drunk. The rry went up to hing McGarvey. Tim-othy Cole, another brother of the dead man, and a cousin, took the leadership of the mob, and with more than 2,000 men at his back hastened to the coun-ty Jail, where they thought the Garvey was hiding, and attempted to force their way through the line of officers with drawn guns. Inside the jail were more officers armed with Winchester infles. The mob secured a long rope from a derrick used in the construction of a building near by, and the shout was made to down the deflects with drawn guns. to follow, made his way to the police station with the rapidly augmenting erowd following him, until it had reached at least 5,000 in number, the mob packing the streets for two blocks about the station. Drawn guns of the officers prevented the mob fron searching the police sta-tion, and the crowd then made its way to the gun store of Carl Engel on West Park street, and despite the attempt of the police to guard the store, forced thelr way into the place and secured a number of shotguns, but for some reason, apparently, thus far have been unable to locate the ammunition stores. The mob leaders say they will have the life of the slayer of Cols, and if an at-tempt is made to raid the efficers. Cole, it is stated, had also been sus-pected of robbing the trunk of his roommate of two checks, which it is al-leged he cashed, and the officers wani-ed him for this act. The police restored quiet at about 11 o'clock tonight after, they had succeed-

The police restored quiet at about 11 o'clock tonight after they had succeed-ed in arresting Timothy Cole, the lead-er of the mob, and a youth named Flynn, who carried the rope; a man who gave his name as Sullivan and a cousin of Cole. These were held in the police station until the mob, lacking a leader, dispersed, when the four were permitted to go to their homes upon their promise to behave themselves. Cole, the man killed by Jackson, has figured in police circles for some time and has been suspected of complicity in several crimes. At the time of the murder of Officer, Fleishmen, Cole was arrested on suspicion of being the mur-dered.

Fully 10,000 persons viewed the re-mains of Cole this evening and for a time it was thought the police would have to put a stop to the morbid ou-riosity of the crowds, as angry impre-cations against the officers were heard on all sides and another uprising was feared, people being in ignorance of the true facts of the killing and their passions giving way to the distorted story which started the mob earlier in the eventing. the evening.

After Voluntarily Surrendering He Immediately Secures a Writ Of Habeas Corpus.

SHERIFF WILL FIGHT CASE.

Does Not Intend to Kidnap Him or Put Him in Irons But Means That Texas Shall Have Him.

St. Louis, May 10 .- Sheriff G. S. Matthews of Travers county, Texas, arrived from Austin, Tex., todaý, to take charge of H. Clay Plerce, chairman of the board of the Waters-Pierce Oll company, who surrendered to arrest Wednesday on a Texas indictment charging him with having committed perjury in an affidavit made in 1900 concerning the oil company.

Immediately after Pierce's arrest a writ of habeas corpus was secured from

writ of habeas corpus was secured from the circuit court, on the ground that Pierce was uniawfully being restrained of his liberty. Hearing on the process was set for tomorrow morning. Sheriff Matthews said: "I will employ counsel to fight Pierce's application for habeas corpus. I don't intend to kidnap Mr. Pierce or take him back to Texas in irons, but I do intend to see that Texas gets what is coming to it in the way of legal representatives. representatives.
