Second day.

Present on the stand: Apostle Woodruff, President A. M. Cannon, of Salt Lake Stake, Elder E. Taylor, of Salt Lake City, Elder Larsen and Counselor O. B. Bishops of Wards and members of High Council.

Sacrament was administered. Bishop Fransen, of Price, gave a report of his ward. Bishop Cox also gave a report of the Huntington

general Church authorities presented and sustained, also Stake authorities and all authorities and were unanimously sustained.

President Woodruff spoke at some length on the great work that we are engaged in, and gave some instructions to the Saints, who were listened to with rapt attention.

2 p.m.

A large bowery was crowded overflowing.

After singing and prayer, President A. M. Cannon spoke at some length in regard to living as Saints of the Most High God, also in regard to our being as a people and in our families, and exhorted the Saints to try to be spiritually as well as temperate.

After Thos. E. Taylor gave some instructions to the young, and exhorted them to be temperate in all things, so that they may qualify themselves to fill responsible positions in the Kingdom of God; said that he was not far distant when he would have to put their feet to the wheel to push on the work.

President Woodruff spoke at some length on the celestial law of God; exhorted the young to be virtuous and live up to all the laws of God, and not to follow after the fashions of the world, as iniquity was rampant, and the people were dwindling away; spoke in regard to the young qualifying themselves to fill responsible positions in the Kingdom of God; admonished them to be united as wards and stakes, and God would bless them in all things.

Elder Larsen gave out that the Society would hold a conference at Castle Dale the first Friday in August.

Conference adjourned to meet at Castle Dale the first Saturday in September.

Good spirit prevailed throughout the conference.

LUIS STAKE CONFERENCE.

Conference was held at Manitou County, Colorado, and 10, 1883.

Saturday, 9.

Conference commenced in the Pool House at 10 a. m.

Present on the stand: Joseph F. Smith, of the Presidency; Wilford Woodruff and Brigham Young, of the Twelve Apostles. Also John A. Smith, President of the Southern Mission; President Silas S. Bishop J. C. Dalton and the members of the local presidency.

After singing and prayer President Woodruff said, we are north or south among the Saints.

The unbelieving and wicked would be chastised with fire. In his boyhood he could not see the same Gospel that Jesus had lived to give.

He said in nearly fifty years he had seen the restoration of the true mission of Joseph Smith, and the Priesthood and the prosperity of the Saints.

Brigham Young said: The Saints would fill those

He spoke on the causes of our tithing, building villages and temples. The man who lived in discordant nations, he said, would lose the blessing he repented. Believed that he was in a better condition before.

John Morgan could notice the prosperity of the Saints. They were in that place by the will of Presidents B. Young and A. M. Cannon. Everything worked for the good of the Saints.

President Wm. Christensen

non read the statistical reports to June 8, from which it appeared that there were in Manassa, 328 officers and members, and 169 children under eight years; in Seritas, 57 and 33; in Ephraim, 123 and 60; in Richfield, 51 and 23. In addition to the above, it was estimated that 200 persons were away from home.

President Silas S. Smith called for a brief report of the different Wards.

Bishop John O. Dalton said, in consequence of loss of crops by an early frost last fall, the people of Manassa were generally poor, and many had to go from home to labor for their support, but they were doing as well as could be expected.

Brother John Becroft said the people of Seritas were getting along peaceably and were seeking to serve God to the best of their ability.

Bishop H. C. Helselt said the people of Ephraim were friendly and agreeable with each other, paid their tithing promptly, and thereby showed their willingness to support the cause in which they were engaged.

Prest. Joseph F. Smith said it was necessary that the people in that portion of the Lord's vineyard be organized into a Stake of Zion. He spoke upon the labors and duties of the Latter-day Saints, and exhorted those who held offices to honor and magnify their callings. He explained what Mormonism was; spoke on the privations and sufferings of the Saints; the manifestations of God's power in their behalf; and testified to God's willingness to bless the faithful and obedient.

At 6 p.m. a Priesthood meeting was held in the new schoolhouse.

Sunday, 10.

At 10 a.m. Conference met in the Bowery.

After the opening exercises, Elders C. C. Brown, J. W. Bean and R. C. Camp addressed the Conference, followed by President Woodruff, who spoke on the unpopularity of the principles of truth and the afflictions and sufferings of our Savior; also on the magnitude of the labors resting upon the Latter-day Saints.

2 p.m.

The Conference reassembled in the Bowery, and after singing and prayer the general authorities of the Church were presented by President Joseph F. Smith and sustained by the Conference.

The names of the local authorities were presented and sustained as follows: Silas S. Smith, President of San Luis Stake; Richard C. Camp and Wm. Christensen, his Counselors.

John C. Dalton, Bishop of Manassa Ward; Silas S. Smith, Jr., and Samuel S. Sellers, his counselors.

Peter Rasmussen, Bishop of Ephraim Ward; Howard K. Coray and Jordan Brady, his counselors.

Thomas N. Peterson, Bishop of Richfield Ward; Milton W. Evans and Jens Jensen, his Counselors.

L. M. Peterson, Presiding Priest of Seritas Branch.

Albert R. Smith Stake Clerk and Recorder.

Members of the High Council—Wm. F. O. Behamann, H. C. Helselt, D. H. Ellidge, Daniel R. Sellers, S. O. Berthelson, John A. Smith, Martin Christensen, John D. Hawline, David Bole, James H. Jack, John B. Daniels and Albin Haggard.

Elder Brigham Young spoke of the labors required for the spread of the Gospel, the obligations which the Latter-day Saints were under to carry it to the nations of the earth, the redemption of the dead, and the importance of obeying all the commandments of God.

Elder John Morgan was gratified to see the rapid growth of Manassa and adjacent settlements of the Saints. The first conference held in Manassa was in an old stable, which furnished sufficient room for all the audience. He exhorted the congregation to encourage education, and the observance of the Word of Wisdom.

President Joseph F. Smith urged the Saints to employ properly the talents which God had given them. The Kingdom of God was onward and progressing. Man, through obedience to the laws of God, was destined to attain to the perfection and glory of our Creator. He exhorted the Saints to obey the Commandments of God and to live in union. Adjourned.
