DEATH OF MARY HORROCKS.

Monday morning, Nov. 27th, Mary Horrocks, aged 79 years and 14 days, died of general debility. The funeral services will be held today at 11 o'clock from the Fourth ward meeting house.

Lester S. Scoville passed away very suddenly Sunday morning at his residence on Jefferson avenue, this city, after a brief illness of pneumonia. The deceased was in his 70th year, and most of that time was spent in this city and county.

Richard Slater, at the ripe age of 82, passed quietly away Sunday, November 26th, at Slaterville, where he has been a prominent and familiar figure for many years. The deceased was a member of the Mormon Battalion.

DEATH OF MRS. C. R. SAVAGE.

The sad intelligence of the death of Slater C. R. Savage, the wife of Utah's leading photographer, will be received with surprise and feelings of deep regret by her numerous friends in this city and Territory. The deceased was a patient sufferer for years. Some months ago, however, she improved greatly in health and there was every reason to believe that she would live to a good old age. But two or three days before her demise she was seized with a chill and on yesterday morning she passed away at her home in the Twentieth ward from an attack of capillary bronchitis.

Sister Savage was born in Leighton Buzzard, Bedfordshire, England, fifty-seven years ago. During all of her associations with the Church with which she became identified many years ago she was a faithful, happy and consistent member. She was for a long time president of the Twentieth ward Relief society, and was one of the most active and solicitous members in her particular sphere of the Old Folks' committee, and the heart of many an aged person was made lighter by her kind words, tender expressions and untiring efforts at the recent gathering of silver haired veterans in the Theater in this city. That was a work she loved as but few persons can. Here was a life of unusual devotion and affection. Her noble traits of character were manifold and her good deeds without number. She was the mother of eleven children, nine of whom are left to mourn her departure. Out of fifteen grandchildren twelve are living.

DEATH OF LEVI W. REED.

Yesterday, November 30, Elder Levi W. Reed, Bishop of North Point ward, Salt Lake county, departed this life. His illness, pneumonia, was of brief duration, lasting only six days. The funeral services over the remains of the deceased will be held in the Six-

teenth ward assembly hall tomorrow, Saturday, at 1 o'clock. This place has been selected because of its affording a better convenience at this season of the year for an assemblage of relatives and friends, many of whom are residents of the Sixteenth ward, of which the deceased was for many years a member.

Bishop Reed was known and loved as a good man. Modest and retiring in his disposition, his associates in every capacity were drawn to him by the affinity which gives attractiveness to the honest, stalwart and true. In his capacity of presiding officer of the ward where he has resided, the poor were the especial objects of his love and kindness. He extended aid in a quiet way, his private means being liberally used for the benefit of others, the objects of his generosity not being confined to his own ward. An instance of his practical ideas and method of helping others may be cited. He furnished means for a considerable number of people to emigrate from Europe. This was advanced to them in the nature of a loan. When they came here he would provide a home for them, and find them employment. He thus enabled them to earn means to pay off their indebtedness and become established in the country. When they became sufficiently acquainted with the circumstances in a new land, they would start out as they chose; but his kindness did not stop on merely enabling them to come here, it extended to opening the way for them to get a start.

The deceased leaves a wife and several children, some of them quite young. His parents were among the early members of the Church, and he has been associated with it all his life. He was one of the first settlers west of the Jordan river, having come to Utah in early years. He was one of the party that first explored the western shores of the Great Salt Lake to ascertain whether or not it had an outlet.

She was much beloved and respected by all who were acquainted with her. She was a leader in all the associations of our settlement. A feeling of deep regret was felt by all at the close of her early and useful life. She was a firm believer in the principles of the Gospel and the spiritual part of her nature was highly developed.—[CON.]

JORDAN.—In Brigham City, Nov. 16, 1893, at 8 a.m., of asthma and general debility superinduced by old age, David Jordan, born February 7th, 1830, at Northy, South Wales. He was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints January, 1849; emigrated to Utah July 24, 1872; was the father of seven children; leaves a wife 77 years old in delicate health, two daughters, nineteen grandchildren and six great-grandchildren to mourn his departure. He was ever ready to bear testimony of the truths of the Gospel. He retained his faculties till within a few moments of his spirit taking its departure and passed away as it going to sleep.

At the funeral services on Tuesday the 28th, in the First Ward, the speakers dwelt at length on the life and character of "Father" Jordan, as he was familiarly called.

RICE.—At Paris, Bear Lake county, Idaho, in her sixty-ninth year, Sarah Peck Rich, relict of the late Apostle Charles C. Rich.

Deceased was born September 15th, 1825, Chenango county, state of New York, and was baptized when eight years of age in Jackson county, Missouri. She was married to Apostle Charles C. Rich in Nauvoo and received her endowments in the Nauvoo Temple. Her mother was a member of the famous Colesville branch of the Church which went up to Zion shortly after Zion's Camp. After passing through the persecutions of Missouri, she went to Nauvoo, participating in the trials of the Saints at that place and emigrated to Salt Lake City in 1847, living in the Old Fort, and one of the first settlers in Davis county, moving to Centerville when it was first settled, where she remained until 1864, when, with Apostle Rich and family, she settled in Paris, Bear Lake valley, where she died.

It may truly be said of her that she was a pioneer in the Church in its travels and in its persecutions. She was a noble woman, was never heard to complain and was true to her covenants and her God. She was the mother of eleven children, eight of who preceded her to the grave. The immediate cause of death on November 29, 1893, was a severe cold, and she was permitted to pass quietly away without pain.

She was buried December 1, 1893, in the family burying ground with her husband and children at Paris, Bear Lake, where her body will rest until the morning of the first resurrection.—[CON.]
