

freely. The riot act was read and the police charged on the mob. Four persons are believed fatally bayoneted and several injured.

BOSTON, 5.—The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe has issued a circular to the stockholders, offering a quarter addition of stock at par. The directors decided that five millions should be spent on the road, and consider the above course better than loading down with a heavy bonded debt. The circular says: In a few weeks we shall probably have reached Florida Pass and made connection with the Southern Pacific. This will give us part of the through travel and freight to and from California. We anticipate a demand from the mining regions of Arizona for coal, mining material, food and forage. In the matter of rolling stock alone we require engines and cars to cost \$2,500,000. Forty miles of side tracks should be laid at once.

LOCKPORT, N. Y., 5.—The Hodge Opera House and the Gargling Oil building adjoining were totally destroyed by fire. Loss fully \$150,000. The Opera House building was owned by John Hodge, and the oil building by the Gargling Oil Co., John Hodge, president. The cost of the opera house was \$100,000; insurance \$36,000 on the building and \$30,000 insurance on the Gargling Oil building. The post office, Western Union Telegraph Co's and Internal Revenue offices were also in the building. Several firemen and citizens were injured by falling walls, etc., but no one was killed.

A Washington special to an evening paper says: In a few days the Central Pacific railroad will be a bonded carrier under Aldrich's immediate transportation bill. The application was received in due form and the bond sent to San Francisco for execution. When it is approved there will be opened for the first time means for direct transportation under bill from the Pacific Coast to Chicago and the east. Goods could go from the east to the Pacific Coast before, being carried by the Merchant's Dispatch Line, one of the first to bond under the Aldrich bill, but there has been no way to import silks or other goods from China, Japan, India or Australia, upon which duty must be paid, by way of San Francisco, up to this time except by the old way of appraisal and collection of duties at the port of first arrival, which is very unsatisfactory to American merchants in comparison with the convenience of doing business under the immediate transportation bill.

PHILADELPHIA, 5.—In a street brawl six years ago Frank Des Moulin was stabbed by William Revell, who continued the bar tender of a saloon near 8th and Vine Streets. Des Moulin then swore vengeance. Early this morning Des Moulin threw a spittoon at Revell, knocking him down. His four companions then held Revell until Des Moulin cut him in the neck, head and body. The attacking party then went up Vine street, and soon met a party of young men snow balling. A row was raised and Des Moulin inflicted frightful stab wounds in the stomach of William Chambers. This man will also die. A police officer almost immediately captured Des Moulin and a third fight followed, and the officer was thrown down and beaten and the desperadoes escaped. Devett Fox and Gray have since been captured.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Two inches of snow fell in St. Louis on Tuesday.

The new commander of the Texas division, Auger, has arrived.

The Whittaker court martial will meet in New York on January 20.

The United States congress reassembled to-day at 12 o'clock.

Two more regiments of infantry will be sent to the Transvaal from India.

The Governor of Ohio has notified the Senate that U. S. Senator elect Garfield had resigned.

Another severe snow storm began in New York City on Tuesday afternoon.

Strict guard is kept over the armories of volunteers in South London.

It is believed that Garfield will retain his old friend, White, as minister at Berlin.

Schurz, interviewed in regard to

the Berlin mission, says he should prefer any other court.

War between Greece and Turkey now seems unavoidable, unless some new solution is found.

The Orange Free State will not allow the sale of ammunition to Basuto chiefs in its territory.

Greece has informed the ambassadors that she will adhere to the decisions of the Berlin conference.

The stage was stopped on Saturday night near Medina, Texas, by two masked men, and the mail bags pilaged.

The reported attempt to blow up the Lord Warden, the British ironclad, is denied by the commandant.

Upwards of 1,000,000 peasants are in absolute want in Samara, Russia, and 750,000 are starving in Saratoff.

With the reassembling of Congress, the Nicaragua Canal projectors are to make a formidable movement.

A dispatch says the Boers have entered the territory of Natal, where the advance of the British will be opposed.

A barge containing 20,000 bushels of grain, capsized near New Orleans on Tuesday, and was a total loss of \$24,000; insured.

Amity is said to be restored between Egypt and Abyssinia, and the roads connecting the two countries are ordered re-opened.

John B. Evans, of Philadelphia, aged 15, was fatally stabbed last night by Martin Dorf, aged 14. Evans had assaulted him.

Governor Lew Wallace is urging the repeal of the *posse comitatus* law. He thinks if he can use troops he can protect life and property.

Dr. Schleimann has presented his collection of Trojan antiquities to the Emperor of Germany, to be placed in the museum at Berlin.

A reward of £500 has been offered for the discovery of the persons who fired at Rev. C. Fleming, rector of Ballinakille, Ireland, last week.

The Russians, in their last engagement with the Tekke Turcomans, lost 3,000 men and much ammunition. The Turcoman loss was slight.

A German war vessel will probably proceed to the Cape to watch the course of hostilities in Transvaal.

Garfield assures a reporter that he has talked and will talk with nobody about his cabinet. He is prepared to receive suggestions.

Judge William B. Wood, the newly appointed associate justice, took his place to-day on the U. S. Supreme bench.

A fast mail train on the Wilmington & Weldon Railway, bound north, ran off the track. Several were injured, but none were killed.

The governor of Poland has been summoned to St. Petersburg, it is believed, in connection with the subject of conferring civil rights on the Poles.

The cold spell broke at Danville, Va., on Tuesday night, and warm rains set in, which are likely to produce a great freshet in the streams.

In view of Russia's increased import duties, it is said that Germany will attempt to renew the war customs, which the Diet has heretofore refused to do.

The Porte, it is stated, will accept, the arbitration of the Powers on the Greek question, as the result of still further recommendation on the part of the Powers.

It is said England has asked Portugal to allow her troops for Transvaal to pass through the town of Lorenzo Marquis, on the north side of Delagoa bay, Africa.

A steamer sailed from London for the Cape, on Tuesday, with 1,000,000 cartridges, and three steamers are now on the way with officers, men, horses, artillery, etc.

The British steamer *Brazilian* ran on a bank in the Mersey and parted amidship. Her cargo of grain was spilled on the beach, but her cattle and pigs were rescued.

The representatives of the Powers at Constantinople have individually urged the Porte to submit to arbitration, declining the French proposals of a collective note.

again on the same conditions, but this time in New York, and on new tables, on which neither he nor Vigneaux have ever played before.

Ex-Senator Mitchell has denied any attempt or desire on his part to become a member of Garfield's cabinet, but he thinks a western man should be given a position as a matter of justice.

Lord Dufferin, in his suggestion for remedying the land evils in Ireland, suggests the emigration from poverty-stricken districts to Canada, with the home and Dominion governments assisting.

A most atrocious murder occurred at a wood choppers' camp four miles east of San Antonio, Texas. One man felled another with an ax for refusing the loan of his horses, and then chopped him to pieces.

A passenger engine on the Charleston and Savannah, went through a bridge over the Ashelpoo River, forty-two miles from Charleston. Engineer James Wilkerson and two colored firemen were killed.

Information received at the last moment concerning the disposition of the Porte, warrants the hope that good sense will finally triumph over the Sultan's hesitation to accept arbitration in the Greek question.

Inquiry reveals the fact that large quantities of all kinds of arms are being sent from Birmingham, Eng., to Ireland, and that the demand in the past two months has been greater than that of the previous two years.

It has been decided to first crush the rebellion of the Boers in the Transvaal and then take the sense of Parliament on the propriety of returning the territory to its original owners and allowing the establishment of an independent republic.

On the 4th of December last, three Chilean torpedoes attacked the Peruvian launch *Urcas*, while on guard in Lima bay, and after a two hours' fight, in which a great deal of powder was wasted, the torpedoes retired. The *Urcas* lost three men killed and two wounded, and the torpedoes were somewhat afflicted.

This morning a fire broke out in the second story of a building on Madison Street, Chicago, occupied by T. E. Lincoln & Co., manufacturers of boots and shoes. Total loss of goods about \$40,000. Loss on building \$20,000. A fireman was hurt by being thrown from a truck and is dying.

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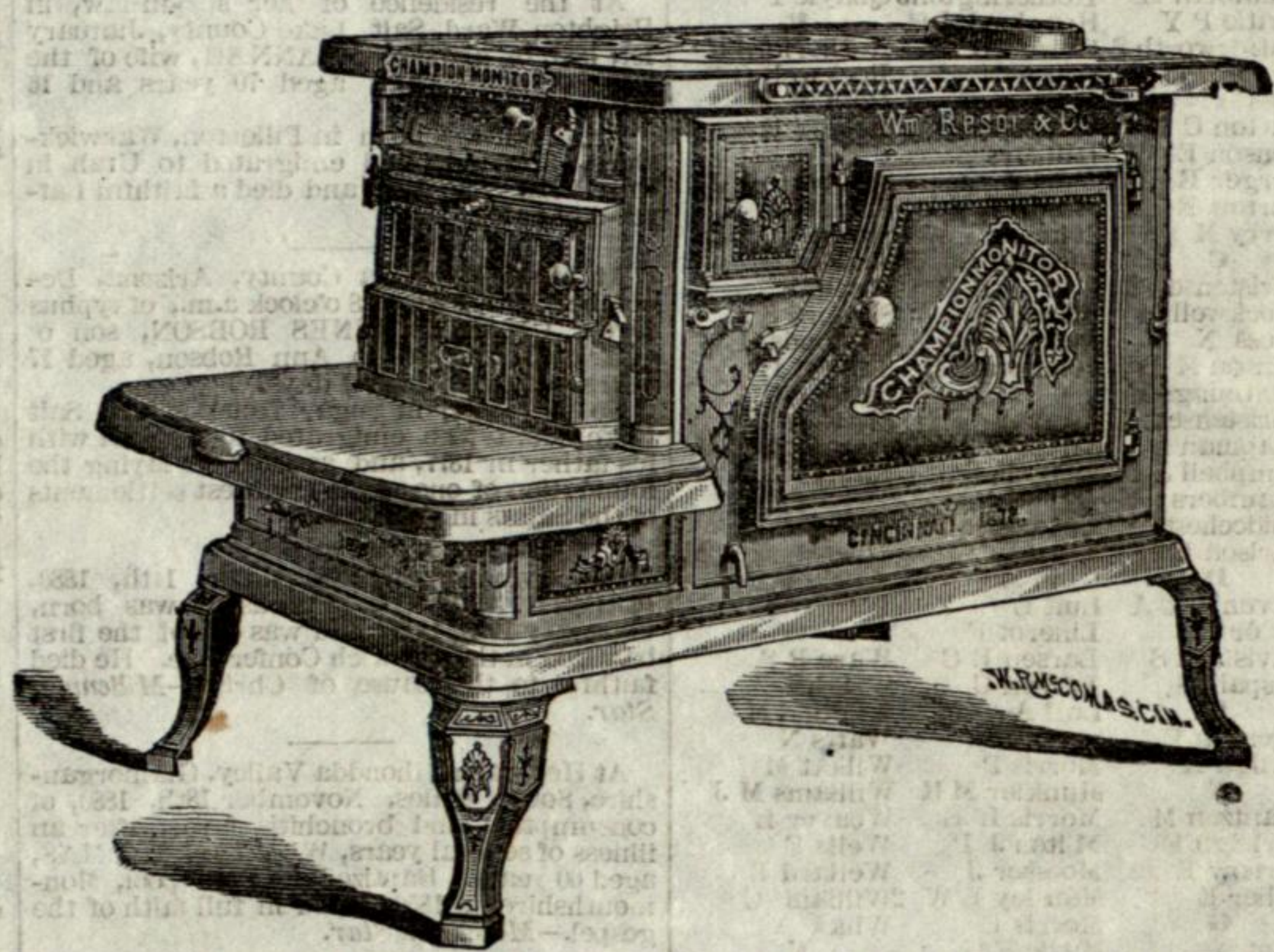
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
