

Theatrical Attraction.—The Hanlon Brothers and Company in "Le Voyage Suisse," are the next theatrical attraction. The place is said to be one of the most entertaining on the stage, and is played with finished skill. It is a remarkable combination of comedy, farce and artistic pantomime, and appeals directly to the popular senses. This peculiarly renders it popular with all classes of people.

The following from the San Francisco *Figaro* conveys some idea of the play and performance:

"All the comic effects of pantomime are introduced in the piece, the misdirected blows, the disastrous collisions, the wonderful acrobatic feats, the grotesque situations, and the comical face-making and gesturing; and all are so neatly and so deftly done as to appear perfectly natural occurrences. In this latter respect the Hanlons, as pantomimists, have no equal.

The three great sensations of the piece are the overturning of a coach loaded with passengers in the first act. Which spills its outside passengers over the stage down to the very footlights. This is done suddenly and with such a crash as to startle the house for a moment. It is a splendid stage effect. The second act takes place in a Pullman sleeping car represented to be in full motion on the stage. By and by comes a collision, an explosion, a sudden breaking in two of the car and a rearing on end of its separated parts all at once, with its passengers seen suspended from trees and scattered around everywhere. The third act is a Swiss hotel; and falling from the top of the stage, somewhere among the flies, where he is supposed to have been prowling around after the mass of the skylight down among the tables and chairs. All the pantomimic and stage effects are done with rapidity, neatness and infallible precision."

The Hanlons will appear at the Salt Lake Theatre on the 10th inst.

Too Much Water.—A good deal of complaint has lately been made by different parties about the water from the irrigating ditches overflowing the streets and sidewalks and manufacturing mud puddles. Last evening the City Council gave Watermaster Wilken a gentle reminder on this head. Mr. Wilken now gives notice to property holders that if the ditches opposite their premises are not cleaned out and weeds cut away from the edges, so that the water may have free flow along the proper channels, he will be compelled to resort to the law and have the penalty applied.

Branching Out.—Our enterprising townsman, Mr. Geo. W. Davis, branching out in business. He has added a dry goods department to his establishment. A stock of goods in that line now occupies the north side of the store, with Mr. C. Hanson to politely wait upon purchasers.

Somewhat Better.—We understood that Brother Miner Atwood, of the 12th Ward, who was seized with sudden illness some time ago, is somewhat better, but his condition is far from satisfactory. The complaint is said to have been a slight shock of paralysis, the effects of which still linger with him.

Fire and Water.—A peculiar genius connected with a hospital in the eastern edge of the city is said to have had some difficulty about water, and when he went to the ditch to turn the aqueous fluid upon the grounds, carried with him a formidable sword and a malediction bellowing pitch. He was evidently bent on carrying the position by force.

Severely Injured.—Yesterday, August 1st, while Brother Peter Anderson's team, of Peterson Ward, Morgan County, was standing at the Morgan City Co-operative Store door, they took fright and started with Sister Anderson, who was sitting in the wagon. On turning the corner she was thrown out, and an examination by Dr. F. S. Kohler, who was found to have a very severe and ugly gash at the back of the head, and some very bad bruises about the body. The doctor stated that no bones were broken. The injured lady suffered from the fall. The team ran off for home, while the wagon was broken to pieces.

Powerful Expressor.—This morning, on the premises of Mr. H. B. Claverton, we saw the largest case mill ever brought to this Territory, being a ponderous and powerful piece of machinery. G. L. Swift & Bros., of Buffalo, are the makers, and it was procured by Mr. Claverton for Mr. Arthur Stagner, of Farmington, who purposes going largely into the syrup and to some extent the sugar business this season. The capacity of this powerful expressor is from 60 to 100 cases of cane in a season. As great is its pressure that cane from which the sugarcane juice has been expressed by it can be burned in the evaporator almost directly afterwards.
