Many underwriters who took these risks freely are closing their books as the premium at the present level hardly allow a margin for paying for possible captures.

NO POSTOFFICE INVESTIGATION.

The President, Senators Aldrich, Spooner and Penrose Hold a Conference on Question.

NOT MUCH KNOWN ABOUT IT.

But Enough is Known to Indicate That No Inquiry is Likely to Be Authorized.

Washington, April 14.—President Roosevelt had an important conference today with Senators Aldrich, Spooner and Penrose, the last named being the chairman of the committee on post-offices and post roads. The conference related to the proposed investigation by a senate committee of the affairs of the postoffice department.

Enough is known about it to indicate that an inquiry into the postal affairs is not so likely to be authorized as it was a day or two ago. The subject is under confidential consideration by senate leaders, and a definite decision, one way or the other, may be reached soon.

Objections to a congressional investigation have been suggested which may induce the senate to abandon the proposition altogether.

A searching investigation into the affairs of the Washington and New York postoffices now is going on. These inquiries were justified by the president himself, and they are very thorough. In addition to these inquiries, Messrs. Conrad and Bonaparte, under instructions from the president, are still pursuing their investigation into postoffice department matters.

Part of the McCall report gives a history of the compilation and publication of the report, indicating members. Its inception, so far as the "clerk hire" cases are concerned, was with Fourth Asst. Postmaster-General Bristow, who ordered a compilation of all cases where members made recommendation regarding clerk hire, for the purpose of securing evidence to justify the assertion that "that a hundred similar cases could be cited."

As to the two Kansas offices mentioned, the report asserts: "The post-offices at Kingman and Erie, Kan., are not mentioned in Mr. Bristow's report, but they should have been, for he is clearly chargeable with knowing that the law was violated in the payment of money to postmasters at those places."

DIETRICH NOT GUILTY.
Special Committee That Investigated Case So Declares.

Washington, April 14.—Senator Dietrich of Nebraska, who is declared by a special committee of Congress to be not guilty of any violation of the statutes of the United States or of any corrupt or unworthy conduct relating to either the appointment of Jacob Fisher as postmaster at Hastings, Neb., or the leasing of the building in that city to the United States for a postoffice.

The report review his testimony at length and the conclusion is reached that the charges cannot be sustained. The committee, with reference to the lease of the building at Hastings, finds that it was effected while Mr. Dietrich was governor and that he has retained a full, true and correct statement of the condition of the building at the close of business on the 31st day of March, 1904.

San Francisco, April 15.—It is deemed improbable that the Pacific Mail liner Colon will ever leave the beach near Aquila, on which she was driven to save her from foundering. The Pacific Mail company has received word that the vessel's back was broken. Under some circumstances there might be a chance for a vessel so injured, but far away as the Colon is from proper wrecking facilities the chances are nearly against her ever being outed.

NO USE FOR HEARST.
New Jersey Democrats Refuse to Instruct for Him.

Trenton, N. J., April 14.—A practically unanimous Democratic state convention of more than 1,200 delegates to elect delegates to the national convention at St. Louis, which today selected an unopposed delegation, was followed by a bolting convention of the supporters of William H. Hearst for president. The bolting convention elected a delegation of 100 men, who claimed they had been illegally deprived of seats in the regular convention. The second convention was held in Masonic temple, the hall having been engaged last night as Hearst's headquarters. The bolting convention remonstrated delegates at large and delegates from five congressional districts. The 14 men named by the bolting convention will go to St. Louis and contest the seats of the men elected at the regular convention.

The regular convention, held in the State street theater, was presided over by Richard V. Lindabury of Union county.

The bolting convention was presided over by Joseph R. Buchanan of Essex county. The delegates of the regular convention were Mr. Buchanan, Col. E. L. Price of Essex, Edward Penney of the same county and Arthur S. Dulfer. The latter has been in charge of the Hearst bureau in this state, the headquarters of which have been in this city.

Ex-Mayor Ames Arrested.
Milwaukee, April 14.—Albert A. Ames, former mayor of Milwaukee, was arrested today on an indictment charging him with accepting a bribe Dec. 16, 1901, from Basil Loe. The indictment is like the others upon which he was first arraigned, but the essential feature of this one is that the same witnesses are not depended on. In the indictment appear the names of Lily T. Ames, wife of Col. Fred Ames, Joseph Cohen, Frank L. Larrabee, Edwin A. Gardner, Thomas R. Brown and two women.

The Buffalo Arrives at Cavite.
Manila, April 14.—The United States auxiliary cruiser Buffalo and the torpedo boat fleetilla, commanded by Lieut. Chandler, arrived at Cavite today. The fleetilla has come out from Hampton Roads. It left Singapore and entered upon the last stage of its long voyage on April 2.
