STAKE ACADEMY LECTURE COURSE

Brilliant Array of Poets, Authors,
Artists and Lecturers to En-
tertain Public.

PROGRAM BEGINS JANUARY 14.

Unfortunate German Sent to Mental
Hospital—Incorrigible Again in
Trouble—News Briefs.

"You are invited to take Pot-luck
with a Poet on Jan. 14, 1905." Such is
the invitation extended to the Ogden
public by the Weber stake academy
lecture committee. The poet to be in-
troduced on that day is Edmund
Vance Cooke, author of "Impertinent
Poems," "Rimes to be Read," "A Patch
of Panes," etc. a poet who has in him
"Something of Riley, something of
Field, nor is there lacking the keenness
of Tennyson, yet unlike any of them, he is
the original Cooke, the cordial and
gentle poet, entertainer, and philoso-
pher." The committee has certainly
made a good selection in choosing Mr.
Cooke to open the lecture course for
1905.

And yet, a glance at the program
shows that Mr. Cooke is but a star
among others, equally brilliant in
his respective spheres. There is F. Hop-
kinson Smith, author, artist, and lec-
turer of national reputation. His
"Colonel Carter of Cartersville" has
been read by tens of thousands, and his
"Tom Crogan" is no less popular. Mr.
Smith is scheduled to appear in Ogden
Feb. 7.

"Colonel Carter of Cartersville" will
be followed by Albert Armstrong in
three illustrated readings as follows:
"The Bonnie Briar Bush," 11 scenes, 11
characters. "The Little Minister," 20
scenes, 13 characters. "The Sky Pilot,"
20 scenes, 13 characters.

All this is but preparatory to the
coming of Prof. S. H. Clark of the Uni-
versity of Chicago. His services have
been secured again, and he has prom-
ised to give at least two dramatic re-
citations. Just what these will be is not
yet announced; but they will be mas-
terpieces whatever they are. There is
also a strong sentiment in favor of his re-
peating "Lysander" as one, and giving
"Cyrano de Bergerac" as the other. A
few who have heard of his masterful
interpretation of the Book of Job de-
sire to hear him in that. It's too bad
the committee can't get them all.
After Prof. Clark's visit the public
may leave the field of the Stake Acad-
emy to literary interpretation for the
"Wonders of Modern Science," includ-
ing radiogram and wireless telegraphy.
These will be shown by W. J. Clarke,
the well known electrical engineer of
New York City.

The local lecturer in the course is
Hon. B. H. Roberts, who comes some
time in April. Prof. Maude May Bab-
cock, who interested her audiences last
year in "The Place of Dialect in Litera-
ture," and "Fennelon," has been chosen
to give a reading in May. She will
close one of the best if not the best
lecture course ever given in the state.
The committee assuming the responsi-
bility of giving it should receive every
encouragement, for the entire com-
munity will be better for having heard
such talent as that mentioned above.

SNOW AND INTENSE COLD.

Sugar Factory Propaganda—January

Richfield, Beaver Co., Dec. 27.—It has
been several years since this county ex-
perienced as cold weather as that of
the past few days. The recent snow
storm came on Christmas eve, and was
such that the weather has been ex-
tremely cold.

This morning the thermometer regis-
tered 14 degrees below zero at the rail-
way depot, and 10 below up in town.
The snow began to fall long and con-
tinued that the dust under the snow
is nearly as deep as the snow. It is
believed that this storm in connection
with those that have come during the
early spring months, has well pre-
pared the soil for the coming
season. So confident are the farmers
—and everybody else for that matter—
that they are celebrating the holidays
with a hearty good will.

LEHI.

BEST FIELDS OF SNAKE RIVER

Unexcelled for Profitable Results—Some
Phenomenal Views.

Lehi, Utah, Dec. 28.—Mr. Heber
Austin, general agricultural supervisor
of the Idaho and Fremont County
Sugar companies, is spending the holi-
days with his family here. Mr. Austin
has been in Lehi since the Snake
River valley, of the excellent land and
water rights they have there and says
they have more water than is needed and
it would be better if not so much water
was used. In speaking of the sugar busi-
ness here he said that the Snake River
valley is well satisfied with best
culture, many intelligent farmers pro-
duce a very profitable crop of beets in
a short time and the farmers of Idaho in
a short time will undoubtedly make the
same success in raising beets as the Utah
farmers. The farmers of the Snake
river valley are able to grow crops in
the best culture, and a great many of these
are now under their second crop of
beets. As an example, Messrs.
W. C. and C. G. Glade of Lehi, who
were picked under in August, 1903, a heavy
second crop of alfalfa and planted 35
acres in sugar beets in the spring of
1904. This acreage produced 35,000.
They employed Japanese labor to do the
hand work for something over \$2,000. The
team work was done by themselves,
namely, plowing, harrowing, preparing
the seed bed, planting the seed, cultivat-
ing and irrigating. The same to the factory, which cost \$2-
35, leaving a net profit of \$4,000. Now this
land has a value of \$100 an acre and
a dividend of 30 per cent on the value of
the land. Among many other successful
farmers might be mentioned Philip Rock-
wood of Lehi, who produced very close to
30 tons of beets to the acre on a 2-acre
patch, netting him a profit of \$40 per acre.
George Ward and Peter Williams also
did as well. This shows that the best
business properly handled is the most
profitable. It is not to be that the
farmers of Idaho know anything about
this. There is no limit to the acreage of beets
that each farmer can grow, and the
abundance of water to cover every
acre of land and there is any amount of
labor there prepared to contract for all
hand labor and the farmer only has to
make preparations to do the team work.
In the Fremont county factory best dis-
tributed, and the prospects for the
next year are excellent.

SUGAR COMPANY BANKRUPT.

Utah Sugar company at the Utah Hotel

pavilion and the banquet will be served
in the hotel. The board of directors and
committees has the matter in charge.
