THE WAR IN CUBA.

Effects and Plans of the Struggle for Independence.

U.S. WILL ATTACK HAVANA.

Deaths of the Insurgents Said to Be American—Victory Probable.

BROWNS, N. Y., Feb. 7.—Alex P. Brown, formerly of this city, now member of the third division of the regiment army under General Grant, gave a graphic review last night of the methods of warfare in Cuba's struggle for independence.

In 1874 Custer was a member of the 1st Cavalry, which was sent to the frontier to put down the Sioux Indians. After the Sioux were dispersed, he moved down to Texas, and scarcely left the state. Since then until today he has been unable to find trace of his former comrade. Custer was the victim of a band of robbers who recently sold the publication of the affair to him for good fortune.

INTERSTATE COMMERCE.

RAILROAD CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF THE REGULATIONS.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 7.—Cables from the Interstate commerce commission to appear at a special meeting of that body in Chicago on February 20 have been received by nearly every western and southern railroad. The commission in this city has been communicating with the railroads and the latter understand that the bill will be as follows: Violation of section four of the act to regulate commerce between the states by the Atlantic and Pacific, and Santa Fe and its receivers will be fined \$100,000.

This case is founded on the complaint of Charles E. Freeman, a dealer in coal at Cincinnati, Ohio. In his charges he alleges he is unable to compete with the railroads in the same line of business at Grand Rapids and in the Michigan points because of the discrimination of certain roads which reduce him proportionately as good rates to Texas as given to others. His complaint is that the railroads undersell the Santa Fe, the Rock Island, the Kansas City, the Missouri, the Milwaukee, the Mississippi, Kansas & Texas, the St. Louis & San Francisco, the Lehigh, Lehigh & Mountain, and Southern railroads.

Turner, a well-known attorney, has been retained to represent the railroads. All three have agreed to appear before the commission, so we also the Indiana, Illinois & Michigan.
