SUGAR FACTORY CLOSES DOWN.

Biggest Run in History of Industry-Fortune Paid for Beets.

Fortune Fails for Beets. Special Correspondence. Lehi, Utah County, Feb. 21,—The Utah Sugar company's factory here finished cutting beets last night and will close down for the season Satur-day evening. The Spanish Fork cutting station closed down Jan. 1, and the Springville and Provo cutting stations about 10 days ago. The run has been a long one, the greatest tomage by far in the history of the company has been made into sugar and the benefits to the employees and farmers in wages and payments for

and farmers in wages and payments for beets has been of untold benefit to the towns throughout Salt Lake. Utah, Wasatch, Sanpete and Sevier counties, as probably \$125,000 or more has been paid for labor and two-thirds of a milpaid for labor and two-thirds of a mil-lion dollars for beets. The average yield per acre has greatly exceeded that of any other year. In Lehl the average reached 17 tons per acre. Con-tracting is now commencing for the 1907 crop, and indications are that a large acreage will be planted.
