FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 29.—The Senate,

25 to 17 took up the House bill

to regulate the carriage of passengers

by sea.

The Doucette immigration bill

passed the Senate.

In the naval appropriation bill,

the pending clause was that re-

garding the double turreted moni-

tors.

The amendment of Baker was

adopted reducing from \$100,000 to

\$50,000 the appropriation for the

completion of the *Albatross*, and

in launching the other four moni-

tors, and prohibiting the completion

of those four vessels without orders

from Congress and directing the

naval advisory board to report as to

the advisability of their com-

pletion; the vote stood—yeas 33,

noys 17.

The Hellenic Republic.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 29.—The mili-

tary expedition to Egypt should

consist of an advance guard and

three divisions, with an effective

force of 12,000 men each.

The Porte desires receiving an

telegram announcing the submission

of Friban Pasha.

Fifteen thousand troops are or-

dered to proceed to Egypt next

week.

Alexandria, 29, 10.30 p. m.—The

explosion heard here throughout

the day was caused by the British,

who destroyed the cannon and

magazines in the forts.

Two armed parties started to night

from the Alexandria passenger

station and started for the

railway cut by the rebels

on the Alexandria side of Mahalla

Junction. Cherif Pasha has arrived

here.

Boston, 29.—The *Herald's* Lon-

don correspondent cables as follows:

A member of the government as-

serts that the only terms of sur-

render are entirely unfounded. Very

little confidence can be placed in

correspondents at Alexandria.

Important probabilities

are carefully hidden from

them. An examining party ap-

proached the forts at Aboukir this

morning. The Egyptians were

ready to fire and the English retired

abruptly. Government has little in-

formation of the progress of Arabi's

affairs, and is not sanguine that the

British will be able to capture

the forts. The British are

being banished of himself and officers,

the disbandment of troops and

the punishment of all suspected of

complicity in the alleged massacre.

Arabi sent a delegation yesterday

to meet the British with a flag of

truce. All were haughty and de-

clined to talk about surrender on

any terms. They were most in-

sulting to the English officers. They

said they would resist to the bitter

end; that Arabi had the whole

country with him. The deputies re-

fused to discuss the English pro-

posals and threats.

The Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, 29.—The sundry

civil appropriation bill was reported

to the Senate by Allison today. It

aggregates \$25,784,000—an increase

over the House bill of \$1,785,000.

Among the items of appropriations

added by the Senate committee are

the following: For payment to the

Cherokee nation of Indians, \$300,000;

to purchase additional beef for the

Indians, \$250,000; for the interna-

tional monetary conference, \$25,000;

life-saving service, \$15,000; to re-

move the bodies of Lieutenant Del

Long and companions from Siberia

to the United States \$25,000.
