EASTERN.

MARSHFIELD, Conn., March 27.—Hon.

James Dixon, U. S. Senator from

1852 to 1869, died at his residence in

this city this afternoon, aged 88, of

heart disease.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 27.—The

assumption of the banking house of

E. C. Seminary & Co. of this city,

has created quite a stir. The lia-

bilities of the firm are placed at

\$450,000. Seminary, the manager,

says the first books were secured

from all the depositors. The

run on the bank was caused by

the fact that a large amount of

stock was being carried for parties

who had been crippled by the Bos-

ton fire, and were unable to take

care of the same.

ALBANY, N. Y.—Tweed, having

resigned his seat in the Senate, the

committee were discharged from

further investigation of his case.

The Department announces the death

of Rear Admiral John B. Montgomery,

at Carlisle, Pa., on the 25th inst.

He entered the navy in 1818, and

was on the river fleet in 1819, and

a midshipman in 1821. He was a

member of the ship-of-the-line "Niagara"

in the victory of Lake Erie.

BOSTON, Mass.—The Senate to-

day rejected all amendments, and

accepted by a vote of 27 to 10, ad-

dressed to the bill to prohibit the

importation of horses.

NEW YORK.—Phil. Stanley,

charged with forgery and altering

Fort Wayne and Toledo and Wash-

ash certificates, was brought into

court to-day, to furnish bail of \$50,000, but being unable to produce it he was remanded. A large amount

of private correspondence has been

seized, which it is believed will lead

to the arrest and conviction of per-

sons implicated.

swindling to-day, and were sen-

tenced to a year's imprisonment

and to pay a fine of \$1,000.
