### FIFTY PERSONS INJURED BY A FILM EXPLOSION

Pittsburg, Sept. 27 .- At least 50 permonse were more or less seriously in-jured and several are believed to have met death shortly before noan today when an explosion occurred in the offices of the Countribut Film exchange, rooms 314 and 415 Ferguson building, sunning from Third to Fourth avenues between Smithfield and Wood streets. The walls of the building, an eight-story structure, are building, while not an office escaped without damage. Windows were blown out and partitions wn down.

Several hundred firemen and police

men are now searching the ruins for injured and dead. The cause of the exclosion is not known. In some manner the inflam-mable films were ignited and the next moment a terrific explanion occurred. The defonation could be heavil for blocks blocks

blocks. Occupants of adjoining office build-ings rushed to the scene and were joined within a few minutes by fremen and reserve squads from the various police districts. Throughout the entire building they encountered more, women-boys and girls who were either burned or injured by flying debris. Every hos pital in Greater Pittsburg was notified and for an bour the clang of ambu-tances excited pedestrians in the down-town streets. town streets.
