New cases of smallpox are occurring every day, and the carelessness of the people with regard to measures for the prevention of the spread of the disease is truly alarming. Individuals who are just recovering frequently mix with their neighbors, in store, theatre, meeting, or sny place where a crowd is assembled. Last week meetings, theatre, and all other public gatherings were stopped. Still the disease spreads. On Saturday there were five new cases. I was told by the mall carrier that there was one person buried on Saunday, at Moroni, and one yesterday, that there are some very bad cases, but they think they have got it in a shape to keep it from spreading there."

"Fountain Green has had 121 cases in all. Quite a number are down at present, several of whom are dangerously ill.

"My opinion is, it more care is not taken in some places, that when hot weather sets in the mortality will be terrible.

"I have received a note from Spring City, stating that three cases of small-pox. One child died vesterday of spectred fever. A number of office children, who were attacked six or eight weeks ago, are still lingering, and no hopes are entertained of their recovery. There have been seventeen deaths (two of these adults). 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
