

PRESIDENT IS DEEPLY IMPRESSED

With the United States Navy, the Panama Canal and Porto Rico.

HE HAD A DELIGHTFUL TRIP.

Returns to Washington Having Enjoyed His Voyage—Holds Cabinet Meeting Today.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Completing a remarkable trip to Panama, during which he traveled several thousand miles by sea and visited not only the isthmus but Porto Rico as well, and voicing his thorough enjoyment of the entire voyage, President Roosevelt returned to Washington at 10:42 o'clock tonight. The trip up the Potomac to the converted yacht Mayflower, to which he and his party were transferred from the Louisiana at Piney Point this afternoon, was made without special incident. As the Mayflower pulled up to the dock at the rear of the office of the commandant at the navy-yard, Miss Ethel Roosevelt, the president's daughter, and Miss Hagner, Mrs. Roosevelt's secretary, were waiting to greet the party.

Mrs. Roosevelt immediately rushed on board as soon as the gangplank was laid and affectionately greeted her father and mother. There were also at the dock to welcome the president, Capt. McCoy, U. S. A., and Lieut. Com. Key of the marine corps, the president's aide, and the commandant and the Fruganayen charge d'affaires. The president landed within 10 minutes after the arrival of the Mayflower. To those who had accompanied him he had had a delightful trip and that he was feeling fine. The president and Mrs. Roosevelt immediately proceeded to the White House.

President and Mrs. Roosevelt reached the White House shortly after 11 o'clock. As the president alighted from his carriage he shook hands with all the attaches and others waiting on the portico. Speaking of his trip, the president said: "We had a very pleasant, very enjoyable time, and I am deeply impressed with the United States navy, with Panama and with Porto Rico." The Panama canal, it was stated by the president, will be the subject of a special message, and consequently on that subject the president will say nothing at this time.

Pedro Roquesa Bermudez, charge d'affaires of Uruguay, was the only member of the diplomatic corps who greeted the president upon his arrival. At the front entrance to the navy-yard Senor Bermudez was delayed by the marine guard, who refused to admit him without the consent of the commandant. After being delayed for 20 minutes he was admitted, and when the president appeared on the deck of the Mayflower the diplomat was the first to rush up the gangway. He protested to the president against the

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manner in which he had been treated by the marine guard. The usual Tuesday cabinet meeting will be held tomorrow. The president left here on his trip Nov. 18, and tomorrow's cabinet session will be the first since the elections. An unfortunate incident occurred in the lower Potomac in connection with the president's trip up the river. The yacht Onida, in the service of the District of Columbia naval militia, and on which were the commanding officers and others of the militia, had dropped down the Potomac to Piney Point, to welcome the president, and was returning when a gasoline boat capsized, and Melvin E. Cleveland, 19 years of age, of this city, boatman's mate, was drowned. Melvin's body had not been recovered up to a late hour.

MRS. MYER'S CASE.

Justice Brewer Refuses Attorneys More Time to Complete Record.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Justice Brewer, in the supreme court of the United States today refused to allow the attorneys for Mrs. Agnes Meyers, under sentence of death for murder in Mississippi, more time in which to file a complete record in the case. The time as originally fixed will expire on Wednesday next.

ENGINEER CORPS, U. S. A.

Secy. Taft Declines to Listen to Any Reflections Upon Its Integrity.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Secy. Taft declined to listen to any reflections upon the integrity of the corps of army engineers and by emphatic interruption today changed the course of argument made to him by J. Horace McFarland, president of the American Civic Association of Philadelphia in opposition to the diversion of waters from the Niagara river for the creation of power and for the transmission of power from Canada to the United States. Mr. McFarland had found fault with the statements alleged to have been made in a newspaper interview by Capt. Charles W. Kunz, of the corps of engineers, who investigated for the war department the applications of persons and corporations for permits to divert water for power.

EXPERIMENTS WITH CHOLERA VIRUS FATAL.

Mantia, Nov. 27.—As a result of experiments with cholera virus at Buitoni prison, 10 prisoners out of 24 who were inoculated have died. The experiments were conducted by Dr. R. P. Strong of the bureau of science. The death of the prisoners took place a few days after they were inoculated. It is claimed by the investigators that the fatalities resulted from a contamination of the virus with bubonic plague virus. Cholera virus is in constant use here and it has proved beneficial previously. It has been used in Spain in thousands of cases with excellent results.

Governor General Smith, in a statement to the public, exonerated Dr. Strong and declared that the commission would take care of the families of the dead prisoners.

THE THAW CASE.

Defense Wants Commissioners to Take Evidence of Absent Witnesses.

New York, Nov. 26.—Clifford W. Hurd, of counsel for Harry K. Thaw, notified Dist. Atty. Jerome today that on Friday application will be made by the defense for two commissioners to be appointed by the supreme court, to obtain evidence from two men who were with Thaw on the night he shot Stanford White at the Madison Square roof garden, and who are now out of the local court's jurisdiction, and therefore cannot be subpoenaed. The men mentioned in the petition are P. Beale, now in Bakersfield, Cal., and Thomas Max Cahill, now in Chicago. The petition states that these two men dined with Thaw and the latter's wife on the night of the shooting and later accompanied the couple to the roof garden. The picture states further that these two witnesses are of vital importance to the defense and that it would be an injustice to bring the case to trial without their testimony.

IN THE CANAL ZONE.

Not an American Has Died There in Last Three Months.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Not a single American died on the canal zone from disease in the last three months, according to a report the isthmian canal commission has just received from Col. W. C. Gorgas, the chief sanitary officer on the zone. The decrease in the death rate among the employees, Col. Gorgas reports, is due entirely to the decrease in pneumonia.

In October the deaths among the canal employees were eight—six negroes and two whites. Col. Gorgas says: "I do not argue that we have found the Ponce de Leon's spring of perpetual life, but merely that Panama is not so bad a place from a health point of view as is generally believed."

KILLED BY INSANE WOMAN.

Albany, Or., Nov. 26.—Melina Palmer, aged 28, shot and killed her cousin, Willis B. Palmer, at the home of her father near here today. Apparently there was no reason for the act. The woman was formerly an inmate of an asylum and immediately following the shooting became violently insane.

MRS. KAUFMANN ARRANGED.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 26.—A plea of not guilty was entered by Mrs. Emma Kaufmann, wife of the wealthy brewer, Moses Kaufmann, when she was arraigned today by Judge Jones in the state circuit court, on a charge of murdering Miss Agnes Potelish, a 16-year-old domestic, who was in Mrs. Kaufmann's employ. Notice was given that arguments would be made for a continuance to a future term of court. The proceedings were devoid of sensational features.

DR. SEYMOUR WEAVER.

Springfield, Ill., Nov. 26.—There was practically no change in the condition of Bishop Seymour today. The patient is growing weaker, if anything.

BLANCH WALSH MARRIED.

New Orleans, Nov. 26.—The marriage of Blanche Walsh, the actress to W. M. Travers, a member of her company, was announced here today. The ceremony was performed Nov. 1, in the New Orleans city court, and the fact was kept secret by court attaches until today, when the records were made public. Miss Walsh was playing here at the time.

OVER HORSESHOE FALLS.

Man in a Small Boat Swept to His Death.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Nov. 26.—An unknown man was swept over the Horseshoe falls in a small boat this afternoon after a daring attempt had been made to save him. An employee of the Ontario Power company saw the little craft coming down the river in the grasp of the swift current. The occupant, a man, was standing up, frantically waving his hands. Two rowboats started down the Chippewa river toward the Niagara and attempted a rescue at the mouth of the small stream. The rescuers were far behind what is considered the danger line, but a cross current carried the unfortunate man away from there toward Goat island,

and in a few minutes he was carried over the Horseshoe falls. The would-be rescuers were by this time in a perilous position, and with great difficulty succeeded in reaching the shore.

RUSSIAN PEASANTS.

Revive Ancient Custom of Expelling Undesirable Characters.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 26.—A novel use is being made by the peasants of the Samara and Buzluk districts, in the province of Saratoff, of an ancient practice, and by the peasants, by which a mass meeting of the peasants of the commune had the right to constitute itself a popular court and expel thieves, beggars, shiftless dissolute or otherwise exceptionally obnoxious persons from the commune into the hands of the police, who sent them in exile to Siberia. This rough and ready measure was at the time resorted to in extreme cases only, the total of such expulsions not averaging more than a few hundred a year, but latterly the custom has fallen into disuse.

In Saratoff, however, the peasants of several dozen villages are now acting in unison and are using this weapon to fight the revolutionists. They have assumed almost blank letters of expulsion, and threaten to enter the name of all agitators and their supporters. In these same districts the houses of several agitators have been burned, and it is reported that the peasants have appealed to the administrative officials of their districts for permission to reinstate the old system of corporal punishment for the commission of minor offenses. As a result of these proceedings the revolutionary agitation in Saratoff province is becoming more and more extreme.

IMMIGRANTS' ROUGH VOYAGE.

New York, Nov. 26.—For four days 1,500 immigrant passengers on the Italian steamer Florida, which arrived today from Genoa and Naples, were kept below decks while the steamer pitched and rolled in a gale which at times assumed almost the proportions of a hurricane. The Florida came through safely, however, and none of her passengers suffered any permanent injury.

SUCCESSFUL BALLOON FLIGHT.

Mantes, Department of Seine Et Oise, France, Nov. 26.—LeBaudy's dirigible air balloon, La Patrie, made its first flight today covering nearly 60 miles.

BIG FIRE IN DENVER.

Denver, Nov. 26.—The Colorado Casket company's three-story warehouse at 1213-1221 Wagon street, in this city, and its contents were destroyed by fire today; loss, \$75,000.

Fireman Patrick Tomlinson was seriously injured by falling from a ladder.

AN ENRAGED ITALIAN.

Murders a Girl, Shoots Her Lover and Tries to Kill Himself.

New York, Nov. 26.—In the presence of half a hundred frightened men and women employees of a tanning factory at 87 Spring street today, Giuseppe Figlia, an Italian, aged 20, shot and killed Antonette Macioce, 19 years old, seriously wounded Vincenzo Lavara, the man whom she was to marry, and then turned the gun on himself. A quarrel over a drinking cup or over precedence at the wash sink, according to the police, led to the tragedy. Figlia was beaten almost to death by the men in the factory after he had been disarmed.

McCARREN NOT AFRAID.

Of Result to Oust Him as Member of N. Y. Democratic Central Committee.

Denver, Nov. 26.—"I am not afraid of the result of the effort to oust me as a member of the New York state Democratic central committee," said Senator Patrick H. McCarren of Brooklyn, N. Y., who is visiting in this city today. The petition states that I charged Hearst is untrue. I will be duly represented at the hearing. Our law committee will look after my interests, but I question the right of the organization to act in the matter at all under the circumstances."
