HE HAD A DELIGHTFUL TRIP.

Returns to Washington Having Enjoyed His Voyage-Holds Cabmet Meeting Today.

Washington, Nov. 26 .- Completing a remarkable trip to Panama, during which he traveled several thousand niles by sea and visited not only the isthmus but Porto Rico as well, and elcing his thorough enjoyment of the entire voyage, President Roosevelt returned to Washington at 10:42 o'clock tonight. The trip up the Potomac on the converted yacht Mayflower, to which he and his party were transfered from the Louisiana at Piney Point this afternon, was made without spe-cial incident. As the Mayflower p illed into the dock at the rear of the office of the commandant at the navy-yard, Miss Ethel Rooseevit, the president's daughter, and Miss Hagner, Mrs. Respect's secretary, were waiting to Rosevelt's secretary, were waiting to reet the party. Miss Rosevelt immediately rushed on

RUSSIAN PEASANTS.

Revive Ancient Custom of Expelling Undestrable Characters.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 26.—A novel use is being made by the peasants of the Samara and Buzluk districts, in the province of Staratoff, of an ancient privilege enjoyed by the communes, by which a mass meeting of the peas-ants of the commune had the right to constitute itself a popular court and expel thieving, besotted, shiftless, dis-solute or otherwise exceptionally ob-noxious persons from the commune into the hands of the police, who sent them in exile to Siberia. This rough and ready measure was at one time resort-ed to in extreme cases only, the total of such expulsions not averaging more than a few hundred a year, but latter-ly the custom has fallen into disuse. In Saratoff, however, the peasants of several dozen villages are now acting in unison and are using this weapon St. Petersburg, Nov. 26 .- A novel use

several dozen villages are now acting in unison and are using this weapon to fight the revolutionists. They have begun by adopting blank letters of ex-puision, and threaten to enter the name thereon of all agitators and their sup-porters. In these same districts the houses of several agitators have been burned, and it is reported that the peas-ants have appealed to the adminis-trative officials of their districts for permission to reinstate the old system permission to reinstate the old system of corporal punishment for the correc-tion of minor offenses. As a result of these proceedings the revolutionary agitation in Saratoff province is be-coming more and more extreme.

Manila, Nov. 27 .- As a result of ex-Manila, Nov. 27.—As a result of ex-periments with cholera virus at Billbid prison, 10 prisoners out of 24 who were inoculated have died. The experiments were conducted by Dr. R. P. Strong of the bureau of science. The death of the prisoners took place a few days after they were inoculated. It is claimed by the investigators that the fatalities resulted from a contamina-tion of the virus with bubonic plague virus. Cholera virus is in constant use here and it has proved beneficial prejury.
