A Man Killed by Getting His Head in a Wheel.

\$4,000 DAMAGE FOR A BIG TOE.

Municipal Electric Light Plant—Copper Killed—Hate a Brake Down—Life Saving Station.

The municipal electric light plant at A. Mohr, Cal., has proved an excellent investment. It will save the necessary and another \$500,000. All the lights the present plant was capable of in use.

City Marshal Cook found an unknown man, aged about 27 years, dead in a box car at the southern Pacific depot at San Luis Obispo, Cal., Tuesday. He was a tramp and died from alcoholism and neglect.

Alex Johnson has sued the Southern Pacific company to recover \$4,000 damages for the loss of a great toe, caused, he claims, by the carelessness of a ferryboat engineer in allowing a freight truck to run over his foot last November on an Oakland ferryboat.

A lad 9 years old named Catherine Tolson, died at the Fresno, Cal., hospital on Tuesday from typhoid received a few days ago while trying to ride a lake boat. This is the third death of the fourth person who was hospitalized here this month on the railroad.

Assistant United States Treasurer Burt of San Francisco, has received over \$5,000,000 in gold at the treasury within the past ten days from successful bond auctions. The money is being loaned out to meet the requirements of the law. Most of the bidders have been very prompt in paying their bids, and the auctions of the sub-treasurer have been very taking care of the coin.

Captain Coulson, chief of construction of the Pacific Coast Life-saving service, has received the plans and specifications for the new station to be erected at Cape Disappointment, on the Washington coast. The new station is to be a model of the kind and will be the finest on the Pacific coast, containing comfortable quarters for the life-saving crew and keeper, and the very best facilities for handling the apparatus used at such stations.

John Dickenson, a wealthy sheep raiser, living about seven miles east of Auburn, Cal., met with a tragic death Tuesday evening while driving his team to the mill. A neighbor, who found him on the road with his head wedged between the spokes of his wheel, which was broken by the wheels of the horse, which was standing in the road. No definite information regarding the accident could be secured as the scene was a wilderness.

The Southern Pacific is today contemplating the building of a bridge which has just been completed at Redbank, Cal. It is 240 feet in length. Another just finished is at Red's creek, in the same vicinity, and the Pacific Coast structures are also to be erected over the third and fifth crossings of the railroad in the same vicinity. The bridge structures are now in progress, and the work will be finished in about three weeks. The bridge will be 250 feet long.

Tuesday night an unknown man, appearing to be about 35 years of age, about five feet six inches in height, was killed one mile north of Mariposa, Cal. The remains were discovered next morning. The coroner's jury issued that the man met death by falling from a train while leaning his way. No papers were found on the remains. There was a scar on the lower lip. On a portion of one arm was part of a tattooed design with the words "Dick of Aggs."

A Helena contractor named McLanahan, who was heading with a friend south of Chinese Camp, in Tuolumne county, Cal., met with a tragic death Tuesday night. The cause of his death was a fall from a high place while he was working on a bridge. McLanahan was standing on the top of a large log when he slipped and fell into a hole in the ground. His fall struck the hammer of the gun and exploded the cartridge. The shock went through McLanahan's breast, fracturing the small bones and tearing away about half of the large bone. It was a painful and serious injury and may result in the loss of the lower arm.

Tuesday, at Marshfield, Oregon, Carl Albright shot and killed his wife, who had left him and was going for divorce. While retelling against Albright was shot by Marshal Elrod and seriously wounded. Albright is said to have been cruel to his wife for a number of years, and his treatment became so bad a week ago that his wife left him and instituted divorce proceedings. He has been doing his utmost to get her to return, and yesterday said that he would not stop until he had all her, and today, after Mrs. Albright had returned from going to the washing for the family of John Wren, in South Marshfield, he made good his threat. Mrs. Albright was a woman that bore a good reputation, and she made the living for both herself and her husband as they walk the coal gas. Albright is very drunk, and was under the influence of liquor when he assassinated his wife.
