SLAVERY ABOLITION.
The Brazilian legation in this city has received information from Rio de Janeiro, that the Brazilian parliament has approved the government bill abolishing slavery, and that it was sanctioned by the Emperor on the 16th inst. The minister states that the bill was passed with extraordinary manifestations of rejoicing. The Department of State received a telegram from Senor Da Silva, which was immediately sent to the President.

MILLS AND THE REPUBLICANS.

It is expected that the republicans will not support the bill, but will offer a substitute of their own.
