LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS

THE PRESSURE ON OUR COLUMNS.
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ADJUTANT. (A.)—Alexander H. Stephens is elected to Congress for the Eighth District without opposition.

LANING. Mich.—The Republican State Convention have to-day nominated James P. Christy for reelection for Judge of the Supreme Court, and P. C. Walker and J. C. Cline Regents of State University.

WESTERN.
SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 27, 1873.
The investigation into the affairs of the shipping commission was resumed to-day, but the evidence was given behind closed doors.

ALPH. E. Servatius pleaded guilty of arson to-day. He tried to burn the Old Merchants' Exchange buildings on Butler St.

COUNSEL FOR STOCK AND ARNOLD, of prominent fame, tried to obtain the municipal court to-day, but the court declined to permit him to argue the matter and he will further plead guilty to-day.

LEWIS CUNNINGHAM has accepted the appointment of harbor commissioner, vice Marks resigned.

MOSES COHEN attempted suicide by throwing himself into the lake, but was rescued. Financial troubles probably the cause.

THE JURY IN THE bogus money case of Wm. Johnson failed to find a verdict. He was arrested at San Jose.

A running race, mile heats, best three in five, for \$500, will come off on Saturday at the Agricultural Park between Nettie Brown and Thad. Stephens.

CORINNE, U. T. 25.—Showing, blowing, drifting, bad. Pretty cold as far east as Laramie. Trains generally laid up. To-day's west bound train from Cheyenne will not come through to-night.

CANADA.
BEAUFORT, Canada, 25.—Mrs. Trasher and five children were burned to death in her house last night.

VIENNA, 25.—A Socialist insurrection is reported among the peasants in the Russian provinces of Volhynia and Podolia. The insurgents are said to be murdering their opponents, plundering and burning property. A force of Russian troops, sent to suppress the insurrection, were defeated.

LONDON, 25.—Count Bernstorff is expected to leave for London to-day. Sir Wm. Fry, Chancellor of the Exchequer, died to-day.

THE STOCKHOLDERS of the London, Liverpool and Globe Insurance Company held a stormy meeting to-day, the trouble growing out of the non-declaration of dividend owing to losses by fires at Chicago and Boston.

NO FURTHER NEWS of the insurrection of peasants in the Russian provinces of Volhynia and Podolia. The Russian government has forbidden the transport of arms and ammunition to the rebels.

SIR ROWLAND STEPHENSON is acting as mediator between masters and men in the South Wales (Dowla) Company yesterday extinguished the fires of their furnaces. It is probable that the coal miners of the north will strike in a fortnight if an increase of wages is not conceded. The mining districts are quiet.

MADRID.—The minister of the colonies has telegraphed to the authorities of Cuba and Porto Rico of the formation of the new ministry, and says that the republic will defend at whatever price, the integrity of the Antilles.

VIENNA.—Austria is disposed to act with Prussia and Russia in support of the new government of Spain, and considers the latter not yet secure enough in power to be entitled to full acknowledgment as one of the European governments.

BERLIN.—The provincial correspondence shows that the republic of Spain is not deeply rooted. It has to make French intervention, and the attempts of European societies to make their profit out of it and cope with it successfully before it can consider itself established.

PARIS.—The moderate left resolved to support the constitutional project of the committee of thirty as amended by the adoption of Dufaure's proposition for a second chamber. The extreme left will oppose, and the moderate right is estimated however, that there will be a majority of one hundred on the final vote.

LA LIBERTE reports a family conflict held by the Spanish Bourbons in Paris, and that ex-Queen Isabella has summoned Prince Alfonso from Rome.

THE leading governments of Europe have agreed to protect Portugal against the aggression of Spain.

MADRID.—The government is organizing an army of 20 battalions to fight the Carlists. Tutan, minister of finance, has assured the officers of the mortgage bank that the government will respect all financial engagements made by the government of Anadeus.

THE journey-men bakers at Stuttgart have struck for higher wages. The association of the German master printers at Leipzig have resolved to lock out all employees who belong to the compositors' society, if the strike now in progress continues after a certain day.

BERLIN.—The Swiss government formally recognizes the republic of Spain. In their note to the Spanish government the Federal council say they hope that after strife and suffering there will be peace and prosperity for the country.

THE London Times of the 18th publishes diplomatic correspondence between the English and Russian governments regarding the affairs of Central Asia, which closed with concession on the part of Russia of the immediate point in dispute, the boundary laid down by the English being accepted.

TO-DAY'S DISPATCHES.
EASTERN.
WASHINGTON.—In the House debate yesterday, the speeches of Butler in defence of Ames and Job Stevenson in favor of the committee's report, attracted an immense audience which included Senators, Cabinet officers, foreign ministers and hundreds of others, prominent in social and political circles. His speech is regarded as one of the ablest efforts of his life, being filled with shrewd, keen points. It was received with repeated demonstrations of applause. He pronounced Ames as the model of an honest, truthful man, whose word was as good as his bond, a man of whom Massachusetts was proud. He declared that there was no money in the sale of each other's names. He ridiculed the charge of bribery in connection with these transactions. It was the most peculiar style of bribery he ever heard of. Butler declared that it was not the transactions of the House of Representatives, but the Credit Mobilier that had angered the public. But the lies that had been told about it, if every man had stood where Ames stood, with God's truth, his storm would have blown over and created scarce-

ly a ripple on the political surface. In the course of his speech he made a fierce and characteristic onslaught on the press, denouncing it as a damnable engine of slander and lies and shaking his finger at the reporters' gallery, said the origin of the Credit Mobilier slanders was the theft of papers in a suit by a reporter. Butler concluded with a criticism of certain points in the report in reference to Brooks.

Stevenson's speech was terribly effective in the immoderate members, the jobbing spirit, which he declared, pervaded Washington. The House, he said, had been turned into an auction room, and more valuable considerations had passed under the hammer of any auctioneer in the world. This, as well as several other points, he said, the speech were understood to be directed at Blaine. He called attention to the legislation of 1868 and 1869, in behalf of the Pacific Railroad, and showed that the Credit Mobilier was exposed and denounced in the House, and declared it was idle to argue that the implicated members were ignorant of its true character.

CHICAGO.—A Washington special says the House adopted a substitute for the resolution for the expulsion of Brooks. The substitute censures Brooks and it was adopted 174 to 32. A similar resolution in the Ames case was adopted 181 to 36.

BOSTON, 27.—Summit's mattress factory, corner of Hanover and Beakstone streets, was burned this a. m. A large number of girls were employed in the factory. Mary Moore jumped from a window and was fatally hurt. The walls fell shortly after the fire broke out and buried a number of firemen. Three, B. P. Stowell, James Shirks and James Price, Jr., were taken out dead. Seven were badly injured, and it is feared others are still under the debris, which is being removed.

NEW ORLEANS.—A proclamation was issued to-day, signed by John McRary, Governor of Louisiana, calling for the immediate enrollment of a State militia, which, the proclamation says, will be disbanded as soon as the present emergency shall cease.

The McRary legislature to-day passed a joint resolution, calling on McRary to use the civil, and if necessary, military power of the State to repress all the judges of the 3rd, 4th, 7th, and 8th district courts of the parish of Orleans, and sustain them in the exercise of their judicial functions.

SACRAMENTO, 26.—Three Chinese men attempted to kidnap a Chinaman last night and were caught by the police.

The San Diego Mutual Association filed articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State to-day.

Parties shipping salmon to the east have great difficulty in obtaining the desired quantity, as the catch is very light this year. Twelve cars loaded with beef cattle passed through to-day, en route from Wadsworth to San Francisco.

NAPA, Cal., 26.—The sale of Messrs. Hass Bros., news agents, and transient traders of any kind, was gained by cutting a hole through the top large enough for a man to get his arm in. The Southern Water Works Company yesterday extinguished the fires of their furnaces.
