## LOUISIANA.

Legislative.

NEW ORLEANS.—In the legislature, yesterday, a bill, repealing the gambling law, passed to its third reading. A joint resolution was introduced for appointing a committee to ascertain what legislation is necessary for the relief of holders of property included in the claims of Mrs. Gaines. A joint resolution was also passed to its second reading, requesting Congress to recognize the belligerent rights of Cuba.

## NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Republican State Convention.

CONCORD, N. H.—The Republican State Convention re-nominated Governor Stearns by acclamation. The Governor declined to accept on account of ill health, but was finally induced to accept. Chas. P. Gage was nominated railroad commissioner. Resolutions were adopted approving the course of the Administration, in favor of the abolition of the franking privilege, endorsing the action of Congress in the Georgia reconstruction case and the principal therein involved, and declaring the action of the New York legislature in rescinding the ratification of the 15th Amendment is a blow aimed at universal suffrage; also pledging support to the industrial classes.

## WASHINGTON.

Monitor Not Seaworthy—Cannon Growing Experiment—Death of General J. A. Mower—St. Domingo Annexation.

WASHINGTON.—Admiral Poor, whose flagship is the monitor Dictator, at Key West, reports as the result of his experience that monitors should not be sent to sea unless in moderate winds and pleasant weather, for then only can they be relied upon.

Commander Trux, of the United States ship, Jamestown, writes to the Navy Department from the Marquesas Islands, that an attempt was going to be made by a company of Englishmen to grow sea island cotton on Woopika Island, and that a grant of several thousand acres of land had been made by the French Government to certain French citizens in Tahiti who have temporarily transferred their claims to the English company.

The War Department received a telegram from New Orleans announcing the death, by congestion of the lungs, of Brevet Major General J. A. Mower, commanding the Department.

It is understood that \$13,000 have been paid for the lease of Samana Bay, over which the United States now has jurisdiction. There is no doubt that the President will send to the Senate, probably on Monday, the secret message with the treaty for the annexation of St. Domingo. A million and a half of dollars is proposed to be given for the public buildings, this being the entire expense of the transaction. The country is to be annexed as a Territory, not as a State.

## NEW YORK.

Foreign Capitalists in a Panic—The Howells and Stanton Funds—Deaths from Small-Pox.

NEW YORK.—Daniel Chadwick, a member of the British Parliament, who comes to this country as the representative of British capitalists interested in American railroads, addressed the Chamber of Commerce yesterday. He said foreign shareholders were in a panic regarding their American investments; they are frightened at the injunctions and contradictory jurisdiction. He believed if there was good management that many English capitalists would gladly invest here largely. He had seen the President, several of the leading Senators and Gov. Hoffman on the subject and his suggestions were that where a railroad traverses several States, the Federal and not the State courts should have jurisdiction.

The Howells fund has been filled up to \$50,000, that for Mrs. Stanton now amounts to \$25,000.

There were seventeen deaths from small pox, mostly children, reported last week.

## MAINE.

Insurrection of Governor.

AUGUSTA, Maine 7.—Governor Chamberlain, was inaugurated last evening; all the State officers and a large number of citizens were present. The Governor's address pays a deserved tribute to the memory of the late Senator Fessenden. It is quite lengthy and much of it is devoted to the financial affairs of the State.

## KANSAS.

Farmer shot by a negro—hanging of the prisoner by a mob.

ATCHISON, Kas.—A few days ago Patrick Cox, a well known farmer of this county, was shot and dangerously wounded by a negro, who was arrested and sent to jail in default of bail. On Tuesday night, a mob of people from the country came to the city and took the negro from jail and hung him. These outrages are bitterly denounced.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

### ITALY.

Opening of the Italian Chambers. PARIS.—Advices have been received from Florence, which indicate that on the opening of the Italian Chambers there will be a ministerial change in favor of the Left Centre party.

### CREAT BRITAIN.

The Suez Canal.—Charles Dickens' Political Views.

LONDON.—A correspondent of the Morning Post, from Ismailia, says that anything drawing over fifteen feet of water, must be lightened in order to pass through the Suez Canal. The dredges so obstruct it that the passage is hazardous. The company decline to take any risk whatever, as it requires a mint of money to keep the work in order.

Charles Dickens made another speech at Birmingham last evening. In the course of his remarks, he alluded to the fact that the former speech of his had been misunderstood; he would, therefore, take this occasion to restate his political creed. He had no faith in the people with small governing powers, but entire faith in them with large. He put infinite trust in the masses but none whatever in the so called ruling classes.

### WEST INDIES.

A Cuban Schooner Captured.

HAVANA.—Intelligence has been received from Nassau of the capture, by the British gunboat Lapping, of the schooner Violin, with sixty Cubans and a large amount of munitions of war. The Violin cleared, on the 17th of December, from Nassau for Puerto Plata, with a cargo of arms and ammunition; the next day the schooner Tweed sailed for Jacksonville, with sixty Cubans. On the 18th, at sea, the Cubans were transferred to the Violin. The Lapping was watching the transfer and captured the Violin and took her back to Nassau.

### SPAIN.

Address to the Regency.

MADRID.—On the occasion of a feast, yesterday, the Cortes proceeded in a body to the royal palace where they were received by regents Serrano and Roman. The President of the Cortes made an address to the regents in which he declared, in the name of all the deputies, that through unity of action alone, could a victorious revolution be completed.

La Policia says that all idea of a dictatorship has been abandoned. The ministers refuse to withdraw from their positions unless a programme of policy is definitely formed.

### FRANCE.

Policy of the Government.

PARIS.—Count Dora, Minister of Foreign Affairs has addressed a circular to the diplomatic representatives of France at foreign courts, announcing that the policy of the French government will be absolutely pacific. The Senate was in session to-day; M. Ollivier and Count Dora were present. The latter announced that the Government was ready to open a discussion on the Ecumenical Council and the relations of France and the Holy See.
