to the gratification of the official, and the interview resulted in the secretary's heartily approving the plan proposed to reclaim the great tract in this state, and in promising to do everything in his power to help the matter along." Mr. Richards then called special attention to what the endorsement of the secretary meant. He said "It means surveying the great Strawberry basin at government expense so as to ascer-tain just how much water can be held there: also, the cost of the three and a half miles tunnel under the divide which will let the water into this ba-sin, and then ascertain just what it is to cost to lay the water down in Salt Lake. This information would cost the state tens of thousands of dollars, if Utah had to pay for it, but now the government will attend to it all. The government will also pay for survey-ing the proposed great canal, a canal as large as the Erie canal, leading down from Bear Lake, and skirting the Wasatch foothills as far south as Goshen. In fact all of the data necessary to as-certain the cost of the entire proposed immense scheme will be borne by the interior department. Then with the collected facts, figures and maps, the department will lay the situation be-fore the people of Utah, and ask their united support of the scheme to reju-venate the state."

Mr. Richards, in view of the enormous benefits to Utah, urges that the citizens especially of the immense section to be thus assisted give their united sup-port to the government officers. He says he explained to the secretary that as soon as one tract of land was re-claimed it would begin paying back to the government; then there would be a the government; then there would be a second tract repaying, and then anoth-er, and so on until the whole watershed was paying back the government the moneys advanced in bringing water to it. At the same time, remarked Mr. Richards, "If the people do not want to avail themselves of the information and aid offered by the government, why, there is nothing to compel them to

do 80. While at Washington, Mr. Richards and Mr. Doremus made it a point to explain to the secretary how more deserving of his special attention was the scheme to reclaim 700,000 acres of land, and correspondingly increase the popu-lation of this state, than to ignore this for smaller projects scattered over a wide area of territory in other states. Secretary Hitchcock said he fully ap-preciated this, and agreed that the Utah proposition was one of the great-est of the kind ever brought up before the attention of the government. In est of the kind ever brought up before the attention of the government. In fact the secretary rather considered it in the ame class of improvements as the great English dam across the Nile at Assouan, and the extensive irriga-tion plants in India. Mr. Richards is satisfied that the gov-ernment will give such an improvement

ernment will give such an impetus to the Utah scheme that it will be event-ually pushed through to completion. In fact he is enthusiastic in his hopes of early realization of the great project.

LAST NIGHT'S SNOW.

Salt Lake, Tooele and Summit Counties Again Got the Lion's Share.

Reports from over the state indicate that Salt Lake got a good share of the late snowstorm, the fall registered here being five inches, as against eight inches at Tooele and six inches at Park City. Other points heard from this morning report from half an inch to two inches, with light snows at Manti and Salina. The reports follow: Logan—Clear; one-half inch of snow, Brigham City—Two inches of snow; cold and clear.
