## **EDITORIAL NOTES.**

In the last financial year, twelve million acres of public lands were sold. This is an area much greater than has been sold in any previous year. A large part of it was farming land, so that somebody is evidently heading the continual cry, "More farmers needed."

At Lona, Arkansas, Dr. Winsted, a merchant and postmaster, placed a double-barreled shot-gun inside the store door so arranged that on opening the door it would pull the trigger. Without thinking, he went back and opened the door, and was instantly killed, the contents of the gun entering his body.

A Washington telegram says that a new counterfeit five-dollar note of the Evansville, Ind., Business College has been received by the secret service, which had been passed as genuine currency, and some of this currency had been circulated until it had worn to tatters. A counterfeit silver half-dollar, made of brass and glass, is also being circulated, which is said to be an excellent imitation.

John Condolst has been taken to Paris as a medical curiosity. On the 17th of May, 1881, being 19 years of age, and six feet three inches high, he found that he had grown something taller than he was the day before. He has continued to increase in stature until he is now 8 feet 10 inches high, his growth being accompanied by great pains in his back, although since June, only his legs have grown. His feet are each 24 inches long.

The electric light has found a novel employment in the hands of some ingenious Frenchmen, who have lately, by permission of their government, been experimenting with it as a lure for fish. The lamp was contained in an air tight globe, and was lowered at night into the sea, with the result that thousands of fish of all sizes were attracted to the brilliant light. Boats furnished with nets gradually closed in upon the living mass, and made a great haul of fish.

Fifty years ago a fair bride in a village of Maine shed many bitter tears because her husband's home was on the steep banks of a river, and her whole life would be passed in hourly expectation of losing one or more of her children through a fall from the cliff into the river beneath. For fifty years she has resided there, and never had any children to fall over that cliff. This is sufficiently ludicrous, yet many people borrow trouble without any more prospect of payment than the Maine woman had.

## **A VILLAINOUS PROPOSITION.**

A wealthy oil merchant in China has given practical proof of his devotion by putting away his comb and shaving, and offering of his houses for a free chapel, besides paying all the expenses of the services he desires the Mission to conduct in it.

A good example for the Latter-day Saints of Utah to follow. A similar course, on their part, would remove the Commissioners and restore to them the rights of American citizenship.

The above is from the editorial columns of the *Christian Advocate* published in this city. What is the course here pointed out for men to pursue who have married plural wives under the ordinance and doctrine of the Church to which they belong? It is to forsake their wives, turn them away, in violation of all obligations moral and religious and of the claims upon them as husbands and fathers. This is truly a "Christian" piece of advice, using that term in its modern perverted sense. And what is the reward to be obtained as the price of such "Christian" villainy? The removal of the Commissioners and restoration to "the rights of American citizenship."

Indeed, well, we do not know of any one who is anxious for the removal of the Commissioners. They are very pleasant gentlemen, and are perfectly welcome to stay in Utah altogether, so far as we are concerned. The "Mormons" have no quarrel with them. It is true we think they have gone further than the law required or authorized, but no one that we are aware of holds anything against them for the discharge of what they have deemed to be their duty. So their removal is no consideration at all.

The other promise is the "restoration of rights." Oh! you admit that "rights" have been taken away, do you? That is just what we have contended. Now if there are any "rights" of which "Mormons" have been deprived, there is a legal way to proceed for their recovery. As to that we have no need of any advice from the truly *Christian* (?) *Advocate* of "putting away" a thing which the Bible says "God hateth."

We are not surprised at the sentiment advanced and the step counseled by the editor of that paper. It is just such a course as we would expect him to take if he were similarly situated to some of the Latter-day Saints. One who has spent most of his time in urging and exhorting, list or plate in hand, exhorting out contributions from "Mormons" and "Gentile," and who has travelled through the land lying against the Latter-day Saints for money, would be just the kind of a thing to repudiate wives, children and any sacred relation or tie for worldly gain or position.

But let us see whether the sound-dreamer's proposals would be of any benefit in the direction indicated. By the arrangements made for the approaching election not only actual polygamists, but those who have long ago ceased to practice plural marriage, are excluded from registration and the polls. The term "polygamist" is construed to mean a person who has practiced polygamy at any time, whether before there was a law against it or since, whether he is still maintaining the relation or was freed from it before it was made an offence by law. Thus those who by the death of their plural wives, or by voluntary separation, have become monogamists or widowers or widows, are deprived of those "rights of American citizens" offered as a bait for repudiation of wives as much as the present practical polygamists.

There are some individuals, passing under the name of "Liberals," who, on seceding from the "Mormon" Church were unscrupulous and cowardly enough to put away their plural wives without the latter's consent. In the expectation of gaining the applause of the multitude and other earthly rewards. And they are to-day, as closely shorn of the franchise as if they had been true to their vows, their manhood and their social obligations. And if ever they get back that franchise it will be as pardoned criminals who have sinned and bent and pleaded for mercy.

Perhaps the peripatetic dime-gatherer who recommends family repudiation for earthly gain would like the "Mormons" to dispose of their plural wives in the same way as adopted by the heathen chief. Being "converted" to the perverted Christianity promulgated by the Methodists, in hopes of the material benefits which those who "compass sea and land" know so well how to hold out to the "benighted," he presented himself with his seven wives to join the church. But he was informed that he could not be a Christian until he had disposed of all his wives but one. He turned away sorrowful. But after a considerable time he returned with his one wife, the youngest of the seven. "What have you done with the others?" he was asked. "Oh," replied the newly converted "Christian," "me-eat 'em."

If the "Christians" of this city who by their misrepresentations and hatred of our cause have stirred up so much trouble in the land, imagine that those "Mormons" who have taken more wives than one and raised up families by them in the sacred relations of divinely ordained marriage, are going to discard and repudiate them and turn their vacated and desolated homes into Methodist conventicles, after the fashion advised by the *Christian* (?) *Advocate*, they must have been indulging in spiritual hashish. When we get down to the level of such villainy and folly as that, we shall be deceiving not only of being deprived of the rights of American citizens" but of the loss of divine favor, social recognition and self-respect.

## **THE FIGHT FOR THE OFFICES.**

WHERE THE MONEY IS TO COME FROM.

Liberal Assessment Number One. We are able to present to the public copies of two very interesting documents. We commend them to the consideration of the people of Utah. They are being sent to all the bogus officials. It appears that a gubernatorial appointment, of any grade, costs \$15 down, with prospects of further assessments. Talk about Jay Hubbellism, here it is with a vengeance: "You will please forward your subscription, \$15, at once." This is the beginning thereof. What it will cost before the end, no man knows. It is a nice little scheme to see certain lawyers. The unfortunate appointees have not only to try to force themselves into offices where there is no vacancy, and in which the people interested do not want them, but they will have to pay the price of the position which will ensue. It is fun for the attorney, but misery for the appointee. If there is anybody foolish enough to forward his \$15 at once, he will commence to drop his money into a bottomless pit. If he doesn't pay up he can step out. "This is a free country, and you just hand over \$15 apiece," if a "Mormon" pays anything for the support of his cause, it is "despotism and robbery," but it is free "republicanism" to levy a tax of \$15 on each office-seeker as a small beginning. You small-fry officials whose places, if you get them, are not financially worth the holding, can have the privilege of paying just as much towards the fight to gain them as the "Liberals" fellows whose expected places are lucrative enough to make a living. The disinterested generosity on the part of the local Jay Hubbells who sign the assessments is charmingly conspicuous.

We direct attention to the style in which illegal bonds are to be filled up and filed, and to the names of the law firms which condescend to such irregular methods of inducing into office persons who have not the shadow of a legal title. And thus the contest goes on. And now we can see where the money to pay for it is expected to come from. Read and mark the following:

September 18th, 1882.  
 Sir: The undersigned appointees of the Governor in the offices in Salt Lake County would respectfully request to yourself and the other

appointees throughout the Territory. 1st. That it is thought advisable, on the score of economy and effectiveness, that the attorneys to conduct the necessary litigation to assert and maintain the rights of all the appointees be selected here, and that each appointee shall contribute fifteen dollars towards a fund to cover the necessary expenses thereof. 2d. That the attorneys here selected be alone entrusted with the management of all said cases. 3d. That each attorney be instructed to at once prepare the bond and oath of office, and instructions to each appointee as to what steps may be necessary for him to take to entitle him to his commission from the Governor, and to forward to such appointees such blanks and instructions. 4th. That the undersigned offer a subscription of \$15 at once to Josiah Barnett, Esq., care of McCormick & Co's Bank, Salt Lake City, Utah, who has been selected as treasurer of such fund.

The undersigned will act as a committee to attend to all disbursements of said fund for costs and legal expenses and will also attend to the prosecution of such suits as may be deemed necessary to test the right of the appointees to the several offices. Among the attorneys who have been consulted and who will probably be employed by the committee are: Mr. Marshall & Royce, Mr. McKirre, Judge Van Zile, Dickson & Varlen, and Williams & Young. U. J. **Perils Voyage.**  
 MILFORD, Mass., 27.—Professor Allen's balloon, escaped the netting with the professor in the basket. He had no anchor, nor had any preparations for the journey been completed, and the valves were not in working order. When the balloon was passing east of Douglas and going southwest.

**Assigned.**  
 NEW YORK, 27.—John S. Tuttle who had an office with the note Allen's balloon, assigned. He is on Pollett's paper for nearly a million dollars.

**Fire in Winston.**  
 WINSTON, N. C., 27.—Wood's manufacturing establishment was burned this morning. Loss unknown; insured for \$30,000.

**Fatal Prairie Fire.**  
 REDFIELD, Dakota, 27.—A great prairie fire is raging in this county. It has destroyed much farm property, and threatens Redfield. Dr. H. M. Towne, formerly of Chicago, and Zachary Taylor, formerly of Taylor Ridge, Ill., were surrounded by fire and endeavored to run their horses through the flames, but the horses turned suddenly and both were thrown from the wagon. Towne's leg was broken and he was smothered and burned to a crisp. John escaped, but was horribly burned.

**Woman Suffrage Conference.**  
 OMAHA, 27.—The committee of the National Woman Suffrage Association is in conference with the committee of the Nebraska Association to plan the coming year in Nebraska. Miss Anthony, Missar, of New Orleans, Miss Hindman, of Pennsylvania, Madame Newman, of New York, Miss Phoebe Couzens, of St. Louis, Mrs. C. J. Boutwell, Mrs. Foster, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Colby, of Nebraska, will speak at the election.

**SOUTH LEBANON, 27.**—Five persons entered an oil boat at 5 o'clock yesterday to cross the Miami River. During a playful struggle for possession of the oars, the boat capsized and four of the party were drowned. Their names are Newton and Ella Waco and Abraham and Belle Lucas.

**Deadly Duel in a Baptist Church.**  
 WYTHEVILLE, Va., 27.—During a session of the Baptist Association at Hampton Cross Roads, yesterday, two young men under the influence of liquor, began a quarrel among the worshippers. Levi Bryson was fatally shot by Jerry Cox, but succeeded in fleeing the church. Both died in the church. Many men were injured by being trampled during the panic.

**The Balloon Captured.**  
 WORCESTER, Mass., 27.—Prof. Allen's balloon has landed about two miles from Putnam. It sailed very low down, and the occupants were secured all right.

**Gilder and Wilson of the "Jennanotes."**  
 WASHINGTON, 27.—The Secretary of the Navy received the following cable message from Minister Hunt at St. Petersburg: Gilder has arrived here accompanied by Henry Wilson of the *Jennanotes*, both well.

**FOREIGN.**  
**LATEST FROM THE OLD WORLD.**  
**Constantinople.**  
 ATHENS, 27.—The report of the settlement of the Turkish-Greek frontier question, by the surrender to Greece of the whole of the frontier fixed by the international commission, is officially announced.

**Austrian Aid.**  
 VIENNA, 27.—An ordinance has been issued authorizing government to expend 700,000 florins in aid of sufferers by floods in the Tyrol.

England has no selfish object, her chief concern is to secure to Egyptians the best government and greatest amount of liberty possible. The abuses connected with the land control will be avoided in the future. The Egyptians will not have to submit to the injustice of an unduly large part of the revenue being appropriated by foreign officials.

**Paris, 27.**—While the Journalist section of the Bonapartists were holding a meeting to denounce the newspapers *Figaro* and *Petit Corporal* the opposition section party forced an entrance into the hall, with revolvers and sword canes displayed, and a number of assaults were committed. The Journalists declare that the recent duel between Didiard, editor of the *Petit Corporal* and De Massas, editor of the *Combat*, in which the latter was killed, was virtually an assassination. The feud between the two sections is becoming very intense. The republicans are delighted at the discussions among their enemies.

**Death of an Inventor.**  
 Le Clanche, inventor of the Le Clanche electric pile, died of an aneurism in his study, in death.

**Fire in Ireland.**  
 London, 27.—Smyth's hosiery factory at Balbriggan, Ireland, was burned last evening; 300 persons are out of employment.
