### COULDN'T GET CO-OPERATION

Of Rudolph Spreckels and Francis J. Hency, Who Are at the Head of The Graft Investigation.

San Francisco, May 20 .- The "committee of seven" appointed by the five commercial organizations of San Francisco to take over some of the power of Mayor Schmitz with the latter's consent for the purpose of bringing about some order in municipal affairs, in consequence of a general disorganization and lack of harmony in erganization and lack of harmony in the city government resulting from the sensational bribery-graft expo-sures, resigned tonight. The reason assigned by the committee for with-drawing was that it had been unable to secure the co-operation of Rudolph Spreckels and Francis J. Heney, who are at the head of the graft investiga-

iton. This action was taken by the com-mittee after a meeting which lasted nearly the entire afternoon and at which Gov. Gillett sought in vain to dissuade the members from taking the step that they did. The commit-tee was to have acted in an advisory capacity to the mayor, and the lat-ter had promised to carry out what-ever it recommended.

gins Serving Sentence on Blackwell's Island,

# CONVICTED OF CONSPIRACY.

#### Left His Home for Penitentiary Alone In an Automobile Without a Guard -Will Work in Bakery,

New York, May 20,-In a big touring car Abraham Hummel left his home in East Seventy-second street today to go to Blackwell's Island to serve a year in the penitentiary for conspiracy in the Dodge-Morse diorce case.

For about three hours he was drivn around the city and then surrendered himself to a deputy sheriff, who

dered himself to a deputy sheriff, who took him by an unfrequented route to Blackwell's Island. He will be put to work in the bakery. Abraham H. Hummel for nearly a third of a century was one of the Doost widely known and successful criminal lawyers in this city. The sentence was imposed upon a con-wiction two years ago. Hummel fought the conviction through several courts, but the final decision was adverse. He has also been disbarred from practise in the courts.

has also been disbarred from practise in the courts. Hummel started for the peniten-tiary from his home in an automobile and without a guard. He had been at liberty on ball and had given his promise that he would go voluntarily to the prison today. A big crowd was gathered in front of the Hummel residence when the little lawyer dash, ed out of a basement door, holding a large handkerchief in front of his face. He ran to the curb, jumped into the closed automobile, and a mo-ment later was whirled away toward the prison.

Hummel reached Blackweil's island shortly before 4 p. m. and began to serve his sentence.

## COURTS-MARTIAL.

U. S. Supreme Court Renders Decision Invalidating Many of Them.

Washington, May 20.—There is a grave apprehension at the war depart-ment that the supreme court of the United States has invalidated the sta-tus of every regular army officer who held at the same time a volunteer commission, and has also invalidated the legality of the proceedings of every court-martial of a volunteer officer or enlisted man on which has sat an officer holding both regular and volunteer commissions. The court last Monday handed down an opinion declaring in-valid the court-martial of Lieut. Lewis E. Bryan, a negro volunteer officer, who was tried and dismissed from the ser-vice in Cuba. The court-martial was invalidated because an officer of the regular army, who was also a volunteer officer, sat on the court. Under the de-cision Bryan will be entitled to draw his pay until the date of the mustering eut of his regiment, and the expiration of his commission. DEFINITION OF A WOUND. Judge Vandeventer Renders a Decision

Saying What Constitutes It.

Saying What Constitutes R. St. Louis, May 20.—A decision was handed down by Judge Vandevanter in the United States court of appeals today holding that is wound, within the meaning of an accident insurance polley covering blood poisoning con-tracted by a physician in a surgical operation must be an abrasion of the skin or membrane whereby germs are introduced into the blood. Conversely, the court decides that the mere con-tact of particles of septic matter with a membrane where no eruption or rupture is caused, is not a wound, al-though infection and injury or death may follow. The case was that of John B. Thompson of Denver, a deatist, against the Fidelity and Casualty com-pany of New York, to secure a judg-ment of \$1,000 against the insurance company in the federal court at Den-ver. ### UNION PICKETING.

#### Judge Sanborn Renders a Sweeping Decision Against 11.

Milwaukee, May 20.-A sweeping de-cision against union picketing was ren-dered today by Judge Sanborn of the United States court, in the case of the Allis-Chalmers company against the atriking union moulders. The strike began about a year ago, and last fall Judge Quaries issued a temporary fi-
