

SPRINGFIELD AND THE WAYS AND MEANS.

The Santa Fe Statement.

Boston, Dec. 14.—The annual report of the directors of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad company was presented to the President of the company from the Atchison system on average operates mileage of 1,111 miles at \$2,000,714, an increase of \$2,000,714, or 10 per cent. The total earnings for the year ending June 30, 1891, were \$8,254,553, an increase of \$1,000,000, or 12 per cent. Total operating expenses, statistics show, an increase of \$361,311, net earnings, \$2,921,275, a decrease of \$197,531.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Washington, Dec. 14.—A private telegrapher has announced the death at Taiping, Indian Territory, of Mayes, chief of the Chinese legation. The assistant chief is said to be dangerously ill.

Dawson, Dec. 14.—The severe snow storm which has raged tonight. Wind of all kinds are down and traffic generally is suspended. A regular blizzard is blowing.

Judah, Dec. 14.—The extensive plant of the White Wine Distilling Company in Liverpool burned this morning. Loss, \$20,000.

Oaks, N. D., Dec. 14.—A fire last night resulted in the death of Dr. D. C. Johnson, 55 years old, value of \$30,000. Nearly the whole business portion of the town was destroyed.

Cincinnati, Dec. 14.—Colonel William E. Merritt, United States engineer in charge of the Ohio river surveys, has his resignation dropped this evening.

Santa Fe, N. M., Dec. 14.—The district attorney has filed suit against the bondholders of asbestos and Cellulose Co. for \$1,000,000, less than half the amount due to the county.

Berlin, Dec. 14.—Van Beek, secretary of the Imperial home office, announces that the news reports of the presence of tritium in American publications are false.

Tucson, Ariz., Dec. 14.—Edward Allerton, who September last, embezzled \$20,000 in cash and nearly a quarter of a million dollars in securities from the Phoenix Trust Co., has been sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary, and his accomplice, Fred W. Chandler, to five years, both pleased guilty.

Canton, O., Dec. 14.—Major McKinley, who has been seriously ill with the grippe, is much better tonight.

Philadelphia, Mass., Dec. 14.—John H. Hinckley, the young party, the largest individual cotton planter in the world, died today.
