Take a nar-row strip, of timber, such as fasten wagon bows together, tack along the ower side of cover, next attach a rope directly in the center of upper side of cover, get on horse with rope and travel through alfalfa sufficiently fast for cover to open with wind and fill with grasshoppers.

Two-Thirds of a Hay Crep - Great Sheep Country. Special Correspondence.

Rockland, Oneida Co., Idaho, July 21. —The grangers of this district are all busy in the hayfield, garnering about

two-thirds of a crop. This district is about eighteen miles long and the population is scattered from one end to the other of the long narrow valley. About the center of this string is located the meeting house and store the latter the property of Andrew Allen, the postmaster and genial agent of the Deseret News. The scattered condition of the people deprives them of many advantages of schools and meetings and social funcschools and meetings and social func-tions, and is a source of discontent to many who are raising families and want their children to enjoy greater privileges than the district affords.
