Necessitates Changes. Ogden, March 25.-Owing to the crowded condition of the high school, the board of education of Ogden has found it necessary to look around for more roomy quarters. The subject was brought up at the regular weekly meet-ing of the board last evening and dis-cussed at some length. It was suggest-ed that the Madison school be taken as a high schood, and an addition built upon it and the present high school be used as a grade school. The matter will be acted upon further at an early date. Upon the matter of buildings, a num-ber of changes will be made before the next school year which will give more room in all the buildings. As there will be \$25,000 in the building fund next year, it is proposed to build separate boiler houses and heating plants for the several buildings.
