SALE OF COURT HOUSE INTEREST

The committee on judiciary presented a resolution for the sale of Provo city's one-sixth interest in the court house to Utah county. The resolution did not contain the amount for which the sale should be made, and Councila an Car-ter moved to insert \$3,600. This motion was based on the terms of an agreement, which was entered into between the county and the city, when the court house was built in the early seventies, which provides that if the county at any time wanted the city to vacate the building the county should pay the city the money it had expended in the con-

struction of the building which is about \$3,600. Councilman Taylor then moved that the council go into executive session Mayor Taylor and Chairman Hill the county commissioners being invit-ed to attend. The motion carried, and the question of the force and equity of the agreement was questioned by the of the agreement was discussed by the council behind closed doors and other matters connected with the proposed

sale and purchase were considered. After the council resumed open session, Councilman Powelson moved to amend the resolution by inserting \$2,500 in place of the \$3,660. The amendment carried by the following vote: Wilkins, Taylor, Powelson, Beebe and McEwan oting for, and Gray, Scott, Carter and Johnson voting against the amend-ment. Chairman Hill, stated that he was not authorized to promise to pay this amount, \$2,250, being the highest

amount the county commissioners had authorized him to offer. The resolution was passed by the same vote as given on the amendment. Mayor Taylor, so it is authoritatively

announced, will veto the resolution. This will probably block the sale even if the commissioners would pay the \$2,500 for the reason it is not believed enough members will vote for the reso

lution to pass it over the mayor's yeto. The mayor's reason for not wanting to sell are that he considers it more economical for the city and county to their offices in one building, and that it is more convenient for the pub-lic to have the offices together, and also that he wants to see a joint building erected at some future time that

Reclaiming Alkali Land by Use of Artesian Water.

Special Correspondence. Richfield, Sevier Co., Aug. 18 .- An im-

portant demonstration of the utility of the black salt-grass lands of Sevier county has been made by President Seegmiller and J. M. Bolitho. These lands which occupy a tract about seven miles long and two miles wide lying along the banks of the Sevier river, have been dormant up to this time excepting as they were used for pastur-age. Last summer President Seegmiller had seven artesian wells driven upon his land whose waters unite and make a good irrigating stream so this is the first year that his land there has been put to the test and the results are most gratifying. He has growing on the land now some of the heaviest cats in the county and wheat with heads five inches long, while his cabbage, tomatoes and sugar beets are all

thriving. The fact that these lands are adapted for agricultural purposes in general will greatly enhance their value and bring thousands of acres under cultivation. A portion of these lands were cultivated in the old days of Prattville but have been long since aban-doned on account of the presence of mineral in the soil which it was supposed rendered it useless.
