### NEED ARIZONA STRIP.

NEED ARIZONA STRIP. "Our country needs the 'Arizona strip.' This is the section of Arizona lying north of the Colorado river and just south of Utah. Several move-ments having in view the annexation of the strip to Utah have been under way, but as yet without successful ter-mination. The Ignd in question has no real value to Arizona, as it is ut-terly inaccessible to the people of that state for commercial purposes, the natural barriers of the Colorado river and mountains of the Grand canyon effectually barring ingress or egress effectually barring ingress or egress from the south. Geographically, it be-longs to Utah, and this fact is recognized by Arizona statesmen; but up to date no agreement has been reached as to terms upon which the strip may be ceded to our state.

WANT BRIDGES.

"Our county needs assistance with its bridges also. Our only outlet to Kane county and Arizona is over the Rio Virgin river, and during high water season the river can not be ford-ed. We are going to ask the state to help us some on building a sub-stantial bridge across this river, and I intend to introduce a bill with this purpose in view. The Rio Virgin river is a very large one, and drains an extensive tract of country. The peo-ple of the valley constructed a dry dam in the Rio Virgin about 12 years ago at a cost of \$70,000, turning the river from its channel in order to se-cure water for irrigating purposes.
