At 4:40 Sargent and Montgomery were appointed as a committee to wait on his Excellency the Governor, and inquire if he had any further communications to make to the Assembly.

At 5 p.m. the following message was received from the Governor:

EXECUTIVE OFFICE,
SALT LAKE CITY, Utah.
March 10, 1892.

W. H. Seegmiller, Speaker of the House,
Salt Lake City, Utah:

Sir—I have received H. F. 130, entitled "An act making appropriations for general purposes." I notice an unusual provision affixed to the appropriation for an addition to the Agricultural College. It is provided that the money shall be expended under the direction of the persons named. It is usual when some public work is undertaken, and there are no properly appointed and qualified officers to do the work, to name the agents of the State in the creating act. But in the case of the Agricultural College there was no such necessity or excuse. I have received from the chief clerk of the Council an official notification of the confirmation without one dissenting vote from the majority party of the persons who were nominated to be trustees of the agricultural college, irrespective of party or creed. They are men of experience, character and capacity. It has been the uniform practice of the Legislature to entrust the expenditure of the money appropriated to the use of the public to the supervision of the boards in control of their affairs. For the first time in our history an exception is made, the time-honored custom is departed from, and an unmerited slight placed upon honorable men. The motives which have prompted this unjust action are wholly partisan. If this action was embodied in a measure by itself I should treat it as it deserves, but it is included in the bill which makes appropriations for the use of the public institutions and for other public purposes.

I am, therefore, constrained to waive my objections in the public interests, which interests must not be sacrificed on the altar of party or personal hates. I am, very respectfully,

The Governor also messaged that he had no further communications to make.

The table was now clear. The members' "tired feeling" appearance had measurably given way to one of relief, each looking as though the only thing now to be done in an official way was to sign the secretary's roll of receipts and receive his money. Pretty soon, after the minutes had been approved and dispersal was in order, Sargent made a motion for adjournment sine die, which met with no opposition; Chaplain Mathieson offered his closing prayer; the ex-Representatives adjusted their attire and slowly separated. At 6:20 the Thirty-first Legislature was recorded with its predecessors among the institutions of Utah that have been but are no longer.

Following is the appropriation bill assigned and filed:

THE APPROPRIATION BILL.

Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah:

Section 1.—That the following sums of money are hereby appropriated out of the money in the Territorial treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purposes hereinafter expressed:

1—For salary of auditor of public accounts for the years 1892 and 1893, to be drawn quarterly.....	4800 00
2—For salary of Territorial treasurer, for the years 1892 and 1893, to be drawn quarterly.....	2500 00
3—For salary of the Territorial commissioner of district schools for the years 1892 and 1893, to be drawn quarterly.....	3000 00
For the Territorial board of equalization for books and blanks, to be paid on auditor's warrants on order of the board, or so much thereof as may be necessary.....	800 00
