Sir—I have received H. F. 130, entitled "An act making appropriations for general purposes." I notice an unusual provision affixed to the appropriation for an addition to the Agricultural College. It is provided that the money shall be expended under the direction of the persons named. It is usual when some public work is undertaken, and there are no properly appointed and qualified officers to do the work, to name the agents of the State in the creating act. But in the case to do the work, to name the agents of the State in the creating act. But in the case of the Agricultural College there was no such necessity or excuse. I have received from the chief clerk of the Council an official notification of the confirmation without one dissenting vote from the majority party of the persons who were nominated to be trustees of the agricultural college, irrespective of party or creed. They are men of experience, character and capacity. It has been the uniform practice of the Legislature to entrust the expenditure of the money appropriated to the use of the public to the propriated to the use of the public to the supervision of the boards in control of their affairs.
