

READJUSTMENT OF CURRENCY SYSTEM

President Confers With Senator Aldrich and Secy. MacVeagh On the Subject.

WANTS COMMISSION'S REPORT

Will Not Be Ready for Some Months—Confronted by Problem of Raising 2 Per Cent Bonds.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 26.—President Taft had two and a half hours' talk this morning with Senator Nelson W. Aldrich, chairman of the monetary commission, and Secy. MacVeagh. Senator Aldrich is about to undertake the adjustment of the country's monetary system and it was in this connection that he was called in conference by the president.

Mr. Taft was anxious to ascertain whether or not the monetary commission will be ready to report this winter. It is understood that a definite answer was given, but chances are that the commission will not be able to place its conclusions before Congress for several months. There has been talk of calling Congress in extra session in the fall of 1910, to begin consideration of legislation looking to the enactment of such changes in the monetary system as the commission may deem expedient.

Mr. Aldrich will call for Europe Saturday to study the monetary system of the leading European countries. Mr. Aldrich would not discuss the subject of postal savings banks. It is believed that he is altogether opposed to the idea, but he frankly told the president at a former conference that he thought the question of establishing such banks should await the enactment of the monetary legislation.

The monetary commission is confronted by the problem of raising government 2 per cent bonds or of maintaining their value. The latter is believed to be difficult if there is to be a large issue of 3 per cent bonds for the replenishment of the general fund of the treasury.

The question of bond issues, authorized in the conference, was considered at the conference. Secy. MacVeagh said he had not progressed much further than when he last saw the president with reference to selecting members of the new tariff commission, which is to advise the president on all matters of the tariff.

John Hays Hammond called on President Taft this afternoon. Mr. Hammond will leave Monday for Arizona on business. He was invited to accompany President Taft through his two months' trip, but will join the party at Salt Lake City in September.

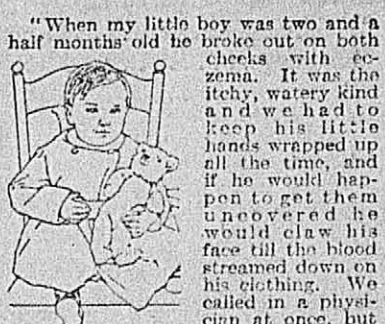

RADIUM ORE IN UNITED STATES

Millionaire Mine Owner Walsh of Denver Starts Movement For Its Discovery.

AN APPEAL TO PROSPECTORS.

Free Tests Will Be Made of All Samples of Pitchblende. Results Being Regarded as Confidential.

Denver, Aug. 26.—The discovery of radium ore in the United States is the object of a movement started today by Thomas G. Walsh, millionaire mine owner. Through the Vinson-Walsh research department of the Colorado state school of mines at Golden, which is supported by Mr. Walsh, tests will be made of all samples of pitchblende free of cost, and the results will be regarded as confidential. To meet the preliminary cost of the undertaking Mr. Walsh today sent to President Victor C. Alderson of the school of mines a check for \$5,000. In his communication to Dr. Alderson he makes the following appeal to the prospectors of Colorado and the United States:

"To prospectors and mine owners of Colorado: Radium has never been produced in the United States. It comes from pitchblende and is of most priceless value. Austria has a monopoly on this ore. Why should we not produce it in Colorado? The richest prize in the mining world is a rim of pitchblende ore. This rare ore is apt to be found in many mining sections of the state. In finding it you will be enriching yourself, placing your state in the front rank and helping to open a new industry in mining."

"The undersigned trustfully appeals to his brother prospectors and mine operators to look for this mineral. He believes the doing so will bring great results."

President Alderson stated that to a limited extent the school is ready to furnish responsible persons samples of pitchblende to aid in familiarizing prospectors with its appearance.

WILDCAT INSURANCE SCHEMES CONDEMNED

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 26.—Wildcat insurance schemes were dealt a severe blow today in the national convention of insurance commissioners when the convention adopted the resolution offered by Commissioner T. S. Love of Texas, recommending legislation seeking to stop the sale of stock in insurance corporations through soliciting agents.

Commissioner Love said that from the nature of insurance business it is impossible that the insurers, as a whole, should be able to protect themselves from soliciting agents can prove a safe investment, in view of the necessary promotion expense of such methods, and the lack of capable management.

The resolution, which is in the nature of an address to the people of the various states, denounces the traffic in insurance company stocks, sold by soliciting agents, as pernicious and indefensible and pledges the commissioners to put forth all efforts to bring it to an end.

FIGHTING IS GENERAL ON MOROCCAN COAST

Lisbon, Aug. 26.—Special dispatches received here from Melilla say the fighting on the Moroccan coast. The new Spanish artillery wrought terrible havoc among the Moors, who have lost 1,000 in the last three days. The Spanish casualties amount to 350. A Spanish column has destroyed the villages near Restinga.

A Moorish deserter, who has come into the Spanish lines, declares that Spanish prisoners after being horribly tortured and mutilated, are decapitated and their bodies hung into a hole on Mount Burja. Estimates place the number of Spanish prisoners at 1,000.

The water being doled out to the Spanish troops is insufficient and driven by their overwhelming thirst, they have drunk from the pools. Many cases of poisoning have resulted. Already 53 men have died from this cause.

GONDA WAS SHOT TO DEATH BY SACACUCHE

Butte, Aug. 26.—The coroner's jury in the Japanese murder inquest at Blossburg brought in a verdict tonight that Gonda came to his death by being shot and stabbed by one Sacacuche, a gambler whose whereabouts are unknown. The body of Gonda shows the marks of three bullets, two of which entered through the chest and one through the stomach. His throat was cut, the jugular vein being severed. A large knife was lightly clutched in his right hand, and evidence shows that Sacacuche and Gonda had been bitter enemies some time and had quarrelled on a previous occasion when Sacacuche swore to kill Gonda. Sacacuche had been hanging around the bunk camp for several days prior to last Sunday, and when the occasion arose he murdered Gonda in cold blood. Gonda also fired shots but they were wild. His assailant is said to have remained near Blossburg until Monday morning at 10 o'clock, when he boarded an east bound freight train and has not been seen since. A detail of officers are searching all of the country around Helena and descriptions of the murderer are being distributed broadcast throughout the country.

DELIBERATELY DROWNED.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 26.—Thomas C. J. Milliken, aged 26, went to the shore of Lake Washington today, undressed carefully, swam out 200 yards and deliberately drowned himself.

His nearest relation is Miss Elizabeth Milliken of Hamilton, Mont. Milliken was a bookkeeper.

EIGHT CONVICTS ESCAPE.

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 26.—Eight state convicts, four of whom were sentenced for murder, escaped at the Rock

Island Junction here tonight by breaking through the end of a box car.

LEAGUE OF AMERICAN MUNICIPALITIES

Montreal, Que., Aug. 26.—Nearly 1,000 delegates were present at the opening of today's sessions of the League of American Municipalities. In the absence of Clinton Rogers Woodruff of Philadelphia, secretary of the National Municipal League, an address prepared by him was read by W. D. Lighthall of Montreal.

Already 40 cities have adopted the commission form of government and are working under it and 33 cities, representing 25 states, are considering it.

"A movement of far greater importance and significance to the future of our cities is that for municipal home rule," the address said. "We cannot boast that we possess democratic self-government if we deny it to our cities."
