Savannah, Ga., now has a population of 40,000—being an increase of about 10,000 since the close of the war.
The Chinese ambassadors have invited Prince Napoleon to visit Peking.
A wife of thirteen has been divorced in New York.
Queen Victoria has expended \$2,000,000 in commemoration of the Prince Consort.
A lady resident of Ames, Iowa, repented of her sins in her 101st year, during a recent revival.
Scarcely forty short-hand writers find employment in France, and the art is taught in but one school.
The number of children of school age in the State of Ohio is 1,019,192, only about five-ninths of whom are regular attendants.
The emigrant arrivals at the port of New York in May and up to June 12, numbered 80,924, against 55,951 in the same time in 1898.
A London theatre has provided a children's room, where babies can be tickled and left with nurses until the close of the entertainment.
A man named Brown shot his wife at Berlin, Ohio, recently. They became acquainted with each other through a matrimonial advertisement.
At the trial of a divorce case in Chicago, recently, the wife testified that their daughter's name was "Kitty Mercy Jane Laura Deldore Ellen De Lo Brown."
A California Woman's Co-operative Union cleared \$1,000 in six months, has \$8,000 stock on hand and engages 160 women.
Nineteen Protestant girls were baptized into the Catholic faith, in St. Philip's Church, Philadelphia, on Sunday last.
Bismarck is said to have asked Napoleon to join him in protecting continental commerce against the invasion of English and American produce.
Trehoire, recently made Admiral of the French navy, commenced his naval career as cabin boy on one of the First Napoleon's war ships.
Frank Paul, General-in-Chief of the Japanese army, is a German-American who commanded the Fifty-second New York Regiment during the war.
An Alabama ruralist complains that he sent four dollars to a jewelry firm in New York for a music box playing twenty-four tunes, and received in return a jewsharp.
A married woman, living near Prairieburg, Ind., went to Monticello recently, bearing in her arms her infant, snugly wrapped. On removing the swaddlings in a store, she found her babe was dead—smothered.
There is a rumor in Berlin that the Crown Princess Victoria is in a consumption, and that her physicians have earnestly advised her to take up her residence in a southern city, or go to Madeira.
In the matter of the pardon issued to Moses Dupuy by President Johnson, which was afterwards revoked by President Grant, Judge Blackford, of the United States District Court at New York; the other day, decided against the discharge of the prisoner, on the ground that a pardon is not complete until it has been delivered, and as the Presidential office never dies, President Grant had a perfect right to recall a pardon issued by his predecessor, if it had not been completed.
A portion of earth near the residence of John Johnson, in Plainfield township, Michigan, sunk recently to a depth of eighty feet, carrying with it several trees and stumps. The open space is funnel-shaped, about seventy feet across the top. Some of the trees lodged half way down, while others went to the bottom, leaving the leaves and branches with in reach of the mouth of the opening. Two or three stumps and a log about fourteen feet in length thrown in afterward, passed out of sight. A distant roaring sound as of rushing waters, is said to proceed from the chasm.
