HICHLY IRRECULAR TODAY

Condition of Activity in Wall Street Stock Market.

Big Sales of Union Pacific-Prices Become Confused, and Shrink-Live Stock Lower-Produce Steady.

New York, Feb. 7,-Wall Street: The market opened active and highly irregular under the influence of large profit taking at some points and buying on a ZINC ORE FOR GERMANY large scale at others. In the opening transactions sales of 8,500 shares of Union Pacific lifted that stock % and a number of the specialties sagged on became more confused, weakness developing in numerous issues on realizations, which others forged up steadily on confidential buying. Pressure was most pronounced in the iron and steel properties, the local group and Balti-more & Ohio. Covering in sugar rallied it 3 points, and there was a marked improvement in Anaconda mining. Near 11 o'clock the entire market reacted, sugar going below 111, and Brooklyn Transit to 75, and a sharp fraction was clipped off prices of the standard stocks. The reaction soon standard stocks. spent its force in the general list, but there were a few issues which contin-ued downward. A heavy buying movement in Metropolitan street rallway rallied it four points, and the other tractions 192%. Prices of other stocks improved all around, Union Pacific ris-ing to 50. There was a shrinkage in the volume of business and prices were irregular.

The bears made daring inroads on values. In sugar and the local traction stocks they forced declines of 2 to 4 points. American tobacco yielded an extreme 51/2. ORE DISCLOSED IN THE FORTUNE

Found in Lower Tunnel and Runs High in Copper.

Besides the above some good values have been encountered at the end of the tunnel. Thus far no trace of lead has been encountered, but the ore is believed to contain a good percentage of

ZINC SHIPMENT.

One of 500 Tons Will Shortly Leave for Hamburg, Germany.

A shipment of 500 tons of crude zinc ore will go out from this city in a few days en route for Hamburg, Germany. The shipment is from the Horn Silver mine at Frisco, where tens of thousands of tons of zinc ore exists which is at present of no commercial value as there is no method of treating it profitably at home. The shipment which is being sampled here will go by way of Galveston, Texas. On reaching that point it will be sacked and loaded on the steamer or sailing ship as ballast. The contains about 30 per cent zinc. If the venture should prove profitable, it is likely that other companies will follow the initiative of the Horn Silver and a number of the zinc producing mines of Utah will find a market for a hitherto useless product.

THE GOLDEN EAGLE. The Difficulties Will Likely be Settled Amicably.


