Succeeds Joseph H. Young as Gen eral Supt., With Headquarters in Salt Lake.

## VINDICATION FOR OLD-TIMER.

Chosen to Once More Take the Helm Of Operation-President Jeffery's Good Selection.

It was announced from Denver last evening, that Joseph H. Young's successor as General Superintendent of the Rio Grande Western (D. & R. G. west from Grand Junction) would be Arthur Earl Welby, who resigned three years ngo this same position, and for a year subsequent was general manager of the Cerro de Pasco road in Peru. The aunsumcement is received in all quarters here with marked expressions of approval, and Mr. Welby will return to be congratulated by everybody having the slightest acquaintance with him. He is at present with his family at his Willows ranch in southern California, but is expected in this city at an early date to resume setive charge of his former superin-

Mr. Welby was first appointed superintendent of the Rio Grande Western in 1890, succeeding Mr. Bancroft in contrel of the road, and in 1892 was made general superintendent, remaining in control until his resignation 10 years later. Mr. Welby is 50 years old, and began his railroad career as a rodman on the Great Western railroad of Canada. He was subsequently associated with the chief engineer of the Canada Southern in the freight offices of the Grand Trunk, and later was chief clerk brand fruins, and fater wills chief clark in the office of the general manager of the D. &. R. G. Mr. Welby enjoys the entire confidence of President Jef-fery and all of the officials of the Gould roads. ## CHIN WING GOES FREE.

#### American-Born Oriental Proves Right To Remain in Land of Freedom.

Commissioner Twomey yesterday released Chin Wing, the Chinaman who has been held for several weeks pending the securing of evidence to prove him a native born American Chinaman. Chin established his case to the satisfaction of even the prosecuting attor-ney and inspector, by securing depositions, taken before the United States commissioner in San Francisco, setting forth the time and place of his birth. The facts agreed with Chin's story in accounting for the certificate of birth dated in September, 1904, which caused his arrest. Chin Yak Ken, a clansman of Ching Wing's father, swore that as

She stated that the mother was a natural foot and not a bound foot woman, and with the father left for China, when Chin was seven years old. HOLDS THE CAPITAL

The Recent Ballot Battle a Vigorous War-Not Yet Permanently Settled.

## FOUR CITIES WERE IN THE RACE

#### Cheyenne, Lander, Casper and Rock Springs All Received Votes but Cheyenne Led Them.

(Special to the "News.") Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 24 .- In the recent election in Wyoming the "capital fight," as the proposition to permanently locate the state capital was called, overshadowed all other contests, because of the bitter light waged for and against Cheyenne, the present site of the capitol.

Interest has not lagged for a moment since the ballots were cast, for the ques. tion of permanent location is an imporfant one to the people of Wyoming, and another thing that has kept the interest up is the fact that reliable returns have been difficult to secure. In some counties the returns on the capital question were held back, and it has been impossible until now to get the

accurate figures. Your correspondent has, obtained, through official and private channels. the official vote cast on the capital question, and the total vote cast, with the vote by counties, is here given for

the first time, showing that Cheyenne falled to get the necessary majority to secure the permanent location of the capital. The returns also show that no other town has been successful, and the question must be again submitted to the pepole, but not until the legislature has provided for another election, if that body has the power to arrange for that body has the power to arrange for another contest, which is considered doubtful by many well informed people. The constitution says that the capital question shall be submitted to the vote of the people at a certain period, and this has been done, but the constitu-tion does not provide for more than one vote on the proposition, and should it be held that the full intent of the the vote on the proposition, and should it be held that the full intent of the constitution has been complied with, then Cheyenne will retain the capital until such time as by a two-thirds vote of the people of the state the constitu-tion shall be amended to provide for another capital election.

CARE head" newspapers are the paper that follows this has well balanced pages. It is never top heavy or one sided in appearance. It is restruit to the eye. It has the appearance of refinement and appeals to the intelliresult of "scare head" living. They will therefore not last long, for the living which causes them gent man as sane and sensible. The scare heads attract attention, but there is already passing away.

By "scare head" living is meant living which craves excitement. Foreigners say it is a peculiarity of American cities. We are strenuous and live at a high nervous tension, they tell us. We are wrought up from morning till the likelihood of a return to sanity. A closer study, however, reveals the fact that the yellowness is paling and sani-ty returning. The end of the demand for such excitement will be met with a complete return to simple night.

The newspaper publishers have observed the same prevailing condition and invented "scare head" newspapers complete return to simple, attractive methods, which will meet with the ap-probation of all intelligent men.-C. C. to fill a demand. They are exciting, and that is the sole reason for their existence. Take the yellow journals with their staring lines and loud mouthed newsboys out of a city's life and note the difference. It will make a new city-quiter and mentally and physically healthier and happier,

The falling off in demand for "scare head" papers goes hand in hand with the country movement. The people are tired out. The papers themselves have overdone the thing. They have made a scare of everything until peo-ple are "scared" to death. Such newspapers might last if they used "scare heads" only on occurrences that justified them-assuming that they can be justified-such as the assassination of a

president or the destruction of city. But when a scare is started over a plain murder, a divorce trial or a horse race the intelligent reader turns away in disgust. There never was any demand for

yeliow journalism except in the large cities. The towns and country never have taken to it and never will. With the cities now turning from it its days may be considered numbered, which is very fortunate thing. There is nothing beautiful, nothing

artistic, in the clumsy scare heads stretching across whole pages, in the black type, the choppy paragraphs, the columns cut into sections of a half dozen lengths and the stories scattered

from column to column until one is lost in the attempt to follow their straggling heads. Country readers have not been able to accustom themselves to a story which did not stay in a column until it came to the end of itself or of the column. They don't like double column heads or any other kind except the plain, graceful, easyto-read single column. City readers for awhile liked the freak heads because they are exciting-almost frightcause they are exciting—almost fright-ful. They are tiring now. Speaking of his favorite paper, a Chicago man said recently: "Why, it never went beyond a single column head except once that I remember, and that was when McKinley was killed. Then it had a two column head. That is the style I like. It is plain, simple and easy to read." And Chicago, it shoud be remembered, is the city of excitements.

Every printer will say that anything beyond the single column head is hide-

ous. Double heads, triple heads and larger cannot be made intogan attrac-

tive page. They will result in a freak makeup. That is all. They will at-tract attention, but so will a bad piece

of architecture or anything else that looks extraordinarily bad. Simplicity and grace are as much to be desired in the newspaper as in art and in writ. ing. They are without question to be found in the single column style, A.
