RECOVERS \$2,500 FOR ARM

Byron Moyes Wins Damage Suit Against Sewer Pipe Company,

Dther Court Cases - Young Couple of 19 and 17 Marry - News Briefs.

Last evening the jury in the case of Stewart Moyes as guardian of Byron. Moyes, against the Ogden Sewer Pipe and Clay company, brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$2,500. The jury was out about three hours, when they arrived at their verdict, which it is believed by a number of people who have followed the case carefully to be very low. The action was brought tu recover \$20,000 damages. The boy, who is but 14 years of age suffered the loss of his left arm at the elbow, which will be an injury that money can in no way replace, and under these circumstances the verdict is believed to be very low. The boy was employed at the clay works, moulding, when through careleasness the presser was permitted to fall on his arm, crushing it off.
