

HOW DR. JONES MET HIS DEATH

Met by Party of Warriors Who Offered Him Dish of Fish as Token of Defiance.

UNWITTINGLY ACCEPTED IT.

Soon as He Ate Fish, Which Was Taken Up of Challenge, He Was Attacked Immediately.

Manila, April 13.—The party recently sent out by the government to investigate the circumstances connected with the murder by Hiongto tribesmen of Dr. William Jones, a noted anthropologist connected with the Columbian museum in Chicago, has recovered the valuable collection made by the scientist during his two years' stay among the wild men of the interior. The specimens will be sent at once to the institution in Chicago.

Members of the party learned additional details of the tragic death of Dr. Jones. It appears that he had been warned that trouble was in store for him and had started to leave the country, where he had been studying the natives at close range.

He returned to the head waters of the Cagayan river to secure boats in which to carry his collection down the river and unwittingly crossed the boundary that had been established by hostile Hiongtoes.

He was met by a party of warriors who offered him a dish of fish as a token of defiance in accordance with tribal custom. Not suspecting that he was accepting their challenge by so doing, he ate the fish and was attacked immediately. The warriors wounded him many times with their spears, but he managed to fight them off with his revolver until he reached a boat, in which he escaped.

Dr. Jones was so severely wounded that he died five hours later and his body was rescued from the river by friendly Hiongtoes. A native servant also was attacked at the same time, but escaped uninjured, saving the scientist's revolver.

KILLED BY SNOWSLIDE.

New York, April 12.—James Montgomery, Jr., has lost his life in a snowslide near Valdez, Alaska, according to a message received here by his father. Young Montgomery was graduated from Harvard in 1906, and was a member of the football team for four years.

Soon after graduation he went to Alaska to prospect for copper along the Haines river, on one of the Guggenheim properties. He was of a venturesome nature and penetrated the country for several hundred miles. The telegram announcing his death gives no details of the accident. Mr. Montgomery, Sr., is a fee merchant.

wife, Mary, shooting away a finger and producing an ugly wound in her neck. Believing her wounds mortal, McFadden placed the smoking pistol in his mouth and sent a bullet crashing through his brain. He died almost instantly. Two children of the couple were present and witnessed the tragedy. Mrs. McFadden was removed to the Red Cross hospital, and it is said tonight she will recover. McFadden's body was taken to the morgue.

It is supposed jealousy and the failure of his wife to return to his home prompted the tragic act.

Last week Mrs. McFadden filed an application for a divorce from McFadden, alleging extreme cruelty and saying at one time McFadden attempted to pour carbolic acid down her throat.

The couple were married at San Miguel, Cal., in 1896.

TO WIDEN FIFTH AVENUE.

Warnings Sent Out to Property Owners By Corporation Counsel.

New York, April 13.—Warnings have been sent out by the corporation counsel's office notifying property owners along Fifth avenue between Twenty-fifth and Thirty-seventh streets that the widening of that thoroughfare will begin by May 1, and that those who are not ready to allow the work to proceed must expect an axe brigade. The avenue is to be widened in order to relieve congestion of traffic if possible. Property which extends beyond the building line will be removed. NEW YORK SUBWAY PROPAGANDA PLAN

New York, April 13.—The Interborough Rapid Transit company, which operates the present subway and which is one of several interests seeking a chance to build more subways in New York, takes a rather unusual course in pushing its idea by publishing quarter-page advertisements in the New York papers today appealing to the people. The Interborough declares that whereas the present subway was built to carry 40,000 passengers a day, it is carrying twice that number. While it was expected that the underground road would relieve congestion on the elevated lines the latter are carrying 50 per cent more traffic now than they did when the subway was planned. Pleading that there is no margin for delay, the Interborough asks permission to build a subway from Forty-second street to the Bronx, and the East Side, one from Forty-second street to the Battery on the West Side, and an express track on both the Second and Third avenue elevated lines.

The advertisement concludes: "The plans for our \$50,000,000 expenditure are ready. Our proposal in writing is before the proper authorities. We are ready to act."

WILL DEPORT BABY BOY.

New York, April 13.—A two and a half year boy is to be deported by the department of commerce and labor today on the steamship Nordam. The child will be placed in the steerage in charge of the ship's surgeon and will be sent to Kischinoff, Russia, whence it was brought last winter with its mother, two brothers and a sister. The mother and the other children were allowed to proceed to Philadelphia to the father who had previously come to this country, but the infant boy, Joseph Pasker by name, was detained because of a disease. It was understood that the father was to pay for the child's maintenance at Ellis Island, but his remittances ceased after a while and the authorities decided that deportation was necessary. In Russia it will probably be placed in a village with relatives. The baby has been told that it is going "bye bye" over the ocean.

W. A. MUIR PUT IN JAIL.

Denver, April 12.—W. A. Muir, the former San Francisco broker for whose return to California requisition papers were issued on Friday last by Gov. Shafter, was placed in jail last night after his bail had been ordered temporarily withdrawn by Judge Shattuck of the district court. This action was taken after a statement in open court by Asst. Dist. Atty. Joseph Parker by name, was obtained admitting Muir to bail was not legal or binding upon his bondsmen. Arguments upon the motion to cancel the bond permanently were set for today.
