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FILIPINO'S VOICE HEARD IN CONGRESS

Resident Commissioner de Leon Made Protest Against Proposed Free Trade With Philippines.

WOULD INJURE THE REVENUES.

Eventually Would Mean Bankruptcy or Insular Government-Also Delay Much Desired Independence,

washington, April 2.- The voice of the Filipino for the first time was heard today in the legislative halls of Congress, It was rather in protest against the system of free trade.
