South African Meetings.—We have been requested to state that two meetings will be held in the 12th Ward Meeting-house next Sunday, Dec 5th, at 4 and 6 p. m. All members of the Church from the Cape of Good Hope country are respectfully invited to attend.

Mild and Genial.—If we could have such fine, mild, pleasant, genial weather, for six months at a time, as we have been favored with to-day and yesterday, varied with an occasional gentle soaking shower, we might begin to brag of our climate as verging on the paradisiacal.

Utah Statistics.—Hon. A. P. Rockwood states that he has taken the statistics of all the counties in the Territory, except Tooele and Salt Lake, having finished up the South in counties on Saturday. He proposes to visit Tooele next, leaving Salt Lake for the concluding portion of the work.

California Salmon.—Hon. A. P. Rockwood informs us that he will have 150,000 young California salmon ready for distribution in the forepart of January. Two months ago he brought to market a fish of this variety, 11 months old, which weighed one pound three ounces.

Would Like Them Confirmed.—The San Francisco Chronicle, referring to the rumors of an exodus of the "Mormons" from Salt Lake to Palestine, says, "We are not prepared to say that we fully credit the rumors to which we have alluded; but we shall be gratified to find them confirmed."

Slate.—Mr. Shoebridge, of Shoebridge, Pascoe & Co., on Saturday brought into this office some fine specimens of blue slate from their claim and quarry on Fremont Island, said specimens being part of a load recently fetched from the island by Mr. Shoebridge. There is no handsomer roof constructed than one of good blue slate, and a little capital and labor applied to this Fremont Island slate would place such roofs within reach of the builders of this city.

Suspended Business.—We understand that Messrs. Taylor & Cutler were under the necessity of suspending business to-day, owing to embarrassments arising from unforeseen causes, beyond their control. Those gentlemen will, doubtless, do everything in their power to satisfy the parties to whom they are liable, and their present circumstances is a matter of regret to their numerous friends.

That Tall Dispatch.—This is how that recent tall dispatch appeared in the San Francisco papers—

"A Mormon ring has been formed here, having as its purpose the admission of Utah as a State. Brigham Young had promised the Democrats that he will run the new State in their interest. Petitions have been in circulation for the past three weeks for this purpose, mostly carried around by polygamists."

A Missionary Trip.—Bishop L. W. Hardy has been on a preaching and business trip through the settlements of Summit, Morgan and Weber counties. He reports finding the people everywhere feeling well, there being a prevailing disposition to aid in helping along the work in every way necessary. In the county last named he was accompanied by Bishop Farr. In a short time Bishop Hardy, who arrived home to-day, will return to the north and make a similar tour of the settlements of Cache Valley.

BY TELEGRAPH.

FOREIGN.

PARIS, 22.—In the Assembly to-day the debate on the third reading of the electoral bill began. All the amendments to the first clause in regard to terms of residence required for voters, which were agreed to on 8th and 9th insts., were to-day rejected, and the clause was definitely adopted as originally submitted.

The Right Centre had a meeting and resolved to oppose all amendments, which the Left and Left Centre intended to introduce. With a view to modifying the vote of the 11th inst., on the 14th clause of the bill, by which *Scrutin d'Arondissement* was adopted as the method of voting.

Ministers Buffet and Dufaure to-day attended the sitting of the committee to which the press bill was referred. M. Buffet said the constitution contained no enunciation of principles. The press might discuss the republican form of government, but must not attack the Assembly or the powers established by the constitution.

The *Moniteur* says it is thought that the election of that portion of the Senate which is to be chosen by the present Assembly, will be fixed for Monday next, and that the government will propose dissolution of the Assembly on the 15th of December.

LONDON, 22.—The appointments of Sir J. Holker and Hardwig Stanley Gifford to the Attorney and Solicitor Generalship respectively are confirmed to-day.

A special from Berlin says Prince Bismarck attended parliament to-day. His health is better than reported. He will speak to-morrow.

Mark Lane Express weekly review of the corn trade. Rain has indefinitely postponed much of the autumnal sowing in England. With the bad condition of samples and continued large imports many markets are a shilling cheaper, but farmers are reluctant to accept lower prices, even for poor samples. When the foreign arrivals slacken, as soon they must, and rents are paid, better trade at more paying prices seems likely. It appears that French reports have been unfavorable. No sowing is done in some districts. This hardened the price of wheat in Paris and the provinces, although flour is somewhat cheaper. Prices in Belgium are firm and in Holland stationary. In Germany markets are inactive and generally unchanged, though at Dusseldorf (Dantz?) and Vienna and in Hungary quotations are lower. Russian markets show no change.

The Colonial Office received a telegram that troops from the British residency at Perak had shelled and captured two stockades at the village where Mr. Birch was murdered.

QUEENSTOWN, 23.—The steamship *China*, from Boston, Nov. 13, arrived to-day. At noon of the 21st, latitude 49° north, longitude 20° west, she fell in with the steamer *Amerique*, Capt. Pansol, of the General Transatlantic Co., from New York Nov. 13, for Havre, with her shaft broken. The *China* took aboard the *Amerique's* mails and passengers. The *Amerique* was proceeding under sail for Havre, all well.

TASHKEND.—After Gen. Kauffmann test Namangchen for Shokand, the Kiptschaks rebelled and invested the citadel and Russian camp. The Russians resisted successfully for the days, when General Scopleff returned and attacked the Kiptschaks, who fled, leaving 3,800 dead on the field. Anarchy reigns throughout Shokand.

John Wells, associate justice of the Massachusetts supreme court, died at Salem this morning, after a lingering illness, aged 56.

LONDON, 23.—Private accounts from Madrid state that the constitutional party is divided, some advocating abstaining from approaching elections. It is also stated that a majority of the ministry disapprove of the reply of the Minister of Foreign Affairs to the Washington note, which was regarded as too moderate. It is understood that the reply, as finally delivered to Washington, was drawn up by Genl. Jovellar, Pres. of the Council and Minister of War.

LONDON, 23.—To-day an election occurred for member of the house of Commons for Mid Surrey, to fill

the vacancy caused by the elevation of Sir Richard Baggalay to the judgeship of the supreme court of appeal. Several liberal candidates had been proposed, but they all declined. Sir J. J. Trevor Lawrence, conservative, was elected unopposed. Sir Trevor was defeated at the last general election at Gloucester, being at the bottom of the poll where there were four candidates.

RAGUSA, 23.—News has been received here from Slavonic sources announcing that the insurgents have captured an important fort, with all its garrison, which commanded Tubci. The insurgents have also occupied several strong positions in the vicinity of Piava.

LONDON, 24.—The amount of bullion withdrawn from the Bank of England on balance to-day was £67,000.

The price of consols at the Stock Exchange to-day has been higher than before, since the first of Jan., 1880.

BOMBAY, 24.—The Prince of Wales and suite returned from Baroda this morning and at once went on board the *Serapis*, which leaves for Ceylon to-morrow.

LONDON, 23.—The Carlist official organ claims that Don Carlos has saved Cuba and the honor of Spain, his recent offer of truce having caused the Americans to modify their attitude.

Intelligence has been received from Madrid, by way of Lisbon, that some Republicans were arrested there at midnight on the 18th inst. Further arrests were feared and several persons have fled from the city. A revolutionary newspaper was clandestinely circulated.

The *Morning Post* gives prominence to the announcement that E. Ward Hunt, First Lord of the Admiralty, will resign and probably be succeeded by Lord Henry Lennox.
