HEARINGS IN DISTRICT COURT.

Evidence Concluded in Big Suit—
Preparation for Settling up New
Tabernacle Organ.

Ogden, Dec. 8.—At the session of the board of education last evening the supply committee reported that it had placed an order for the muskets to be used by the recently-organized high school cadets. This company is undergoing military drill each day, and is about 30 strong.

The plan decided upon for the Christmas vacation was from Dec. 24 to Jan. 7. It was also decided to pay the teachers two weeks' salary just before the holidays. For the teachers attending the State Teachers' convention to be held here Jan. 1, 2, 3 and 4, an appropriation of \$3.50 was made for each teacher living in the city.

The finance committee reported having received \$10,000 from taxes, and the balance on hand of \$17,127.90. The teachers' warrants aggregating \$7,206.65 will be paid today.

The superintendent's report for November showed an enrollment of 4,662. The percentage of attendance was 93.7 and the punctuality was 99.8. The treasurer's report showed receipts aggregating \$36,700.73 and disbursements \$23,441.11, leaving a balance on hand Dec. 1 of \$13,259.62. A number of bills were allowed.

DISTRICT COURT BUSINESS.

Evidence in Big Suit all in—Two Divorces Granted.

Ogden, Dec. 8.—All the evidence has been introduced in the case of the Utah Construction company against the Oregon Short Line Railroad company, wherein judgment in the sum of \$90,000 is prayed for, and next Monday the arguments will be made to the jury. The case has been vigorously fought by both sides.

ORGAN SOON IN PLACE.

Parts Now in Tabernacle in Hands of Expert.

Ogden, Dec. 8.—The large new Tabernacle organ was transferred from the depot yards to the building yesterday and today ready to be set in its proper place. August Holberg, an expert pipe organ builder of the Kimball organ company of Chicago, has arrived to supervise setting up the beautiful instrument, which will occupy about three weeks' time. The organ weighs about 18 tons. It is claimed by Mr. Holberg to be of exceptionally good workmanship, and very fine tone quality. It is the intention of Prof. Bultantyne, director of the choir to give a grand concert in the tabernacle the beginning of January. He says the organization is preparing some very fine choruses which will surprise the public when rendered, as it is some of the heaviest work ever undertaken by any choir in Utah, and he is more than pleased with the excellent manner in which the choir has taken hold of the work of preparing for the concert.

COMMISSIONER MCKAY WILL QUALIFY.

County Clerk Matson has received the official appointment by Gov. Cutler of Hon David McKay as county commissioner for Weber county, to fill the vacancy in the board. Mr. McKay will take the oath of office at the office so as to be ready to assume his new duties Monday morning. His appointment is universally approved.

SMOOTH GRAFTER ARRESTED.

J. D. Kennedy alias George D. Swanson was brought back to Ogden last evening by Chief of Police Browning from Salt Lake City, to face the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. It is claimed that he passed several worthless checks around Ogden about 10 days ago, securing on the same considerable money, after which he shipped the town, going to Salt Lake City, where he also turned a few tricks, but was landed in jail there before he

had a chance to get out of town, but as the charges against him were the most serious, he was turned over to the local police. Kennedy was employed in Ogden at the skating rink as instructor, and was following similar work in Salt Lake when arrested. He is a smooth talker and after getting into the good graces of his acquaintances secures from them money on some pretense or another, but it is believed his offense here he will never repeat and that he will now spend some time in jail for his wrong doings.

Joseph W. Bissell answers final summons—Grand School Dedicated.

Springville, Utah Co., Dec. 6.—Joseph W. Bissell departed this life at the age of 76. Deceased was the son of Henry Jan. 1, 1830, at Boston, Mass. He was baptized a member of the Church in December, 1850. In Iowa, came to Utah in 1852, by ox team. Moved to Springville the next spring, where he resided until his death. He was for many years superintendent of Z. C. M. L. of Springville, and took part with the early settlers in building up Springville. He leaves a wife, five daughters and two sons. Funeral will be held Sunday.

McENERNEY ACT VALID.
Permits Owners to Establish Titles to Property Where Deeds Were Burned.
San Francisco, Dec. 7.—The supreme court today, in an opinion by Justice Sloss, in which all the court concurred, decided that the McEnerney act, passed at the last session of the legislature, is constitutional and that property owners can establish title to their lands, the records of which were destroyed by the great fire, by suing the world at large.

WILSON MURDER TRIAL.
Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 7.—Mrs. W. T. Wilson, wife of the man on trial for the murder of Wallace Belden in Long Beach, Aug. 27, was the principal witness today. She swore that she had indicted her husband to slay Belden because of his having mistreated her 15-year-old daughter. Police Chief Hovey and Constable Lynn of Long Beach testified that they had told Wilson they would kill a man for committing a crime like that charged to Belden. Emotional insanity is the plea of the defense. Wilson shot Belden to death on the streets.

SHOT TO STOP ROUGH HOUSE.
San Jose, Cal., Dec. 7.—Burrell Hogan, who last night died three days into Frank Adams, an employee of the local telephone company, at the Kirk saloon, corner of Santa Clara and Pleasant streets, was arrested this morning by police officers in a room above the saloon. He is a stranger, and says he shot Adams to stop a "rough house." Adams has a slim chance for recovery.

WON BET, LOST LIFE.
Lexington, Ky., Dec. 7.—William Howard, a negro, upon a wager here today, lost his life by drinking the disease of whiskey, and a dozen glasses of gin in a saloon in half an hour's time. The coroner's inquest said death was due to alcoholic apoplexy.

Mrs. Ann Bullock Lays Down Life's Cares at 79—Coal Shortage.

Provo, Dec. 8.—Mrs. Ann Bullock, wife of the late B. K. Bullock, died at her home in this city yesterday at 12:30 o'clock, from general debility, after about a year's illness. The deceased was born in England 79 years ago. She came to Utah about 35 years ago, locating in Provo, and shortly after married Mr. Bullock. Since that time she has lived in Provo, except a few years, when she was in Nevada, her husband having been called there on the colonizing mission to the Muddy. Mrs. Bullock was an energetic, kindly woman, devoted to her family, and many friends will sympathize with the family in their bereavement. She leaves four grown sons and 27 grandchildren. The time for the funeral has not been fixed, as the members of the family here are waiting to hear from two sons, who are in Canada.

SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

Investigating Coal Shortage—Combined Choirs Preparing Musical.

Murray, Dec. 8.—The tax payers and residents of Murray presented a petition asking that the road between Jones and the Highland Boy street be repaired as it gets in a very bad condition during stormy weather. The council decided not to lay out any more money than the amount of toll for the repair of the street.
A petition was presented asking that the east side of State street north from Seventeenth South to Reynolds' corner, be improved by putting in the same sidewalk as the west side, including curbs. The street committee was instructed to investigate the matter and determine the cost of the improvement.
The road supervisor's reports were allowed and the warrants ordered drawn on the treasury to the amount of \$229.
Mayor Brown informed the council that there are numerous families in and near Murray who are actually suffering from cold because no coal can be had on account of there being none supplied to Murray dealers by the railroad and coal companies. He suggested that there be a committee appointed by the president of the Murray city council and that said committee be instructed
