Deceased was born on the 17th day of Jan. 1847, in Pueblo, Mexico in the Battalion. She died in full faith of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

OBITUARY.

Died at Orderville, Kane County, Utah, October 22nd, 1880, ZEMIRA PALMER, rother Palmer was born in the Province of Upper Canada, County of Frontenac, Midland District, Fast Laborough, August 8th, 1831. His mother was baptized by Elder B. Young in 1833. His father, who opposed the truth, died in 1834, and in 1835 the family moved to Kirtland, Ohio, and shared the many persecutions the Saints were called to endure. At Council Bluffs he sought to enlist in the Mormon Battalion, but his age and feeble appearance barred his enlistment. He was, however, determined to take part in that mission, and found employment as a servant to Captain Allen, until the Captain's death, when he was attached to Lieutenant Clark, and bore cheerfully all the trials of that unparalleled journey. He reached the valley in the fall of 1838. December 1st, 1851, he married Sally Knight, eldest daughter of Newell Knight. August 10th, 1857, he was ordained a member of the Forty-fifth Quorum of Seventies. In 1863, with his own team he crossed the plains to help gather the poor. Was in the snow with the hand-cart companies, and was one of the guard in Echo Canyon during the Buchanan War. In 1865 was called to Southern Utah, and located by direction of President F. Snow at Meadow Valley. On the 11th of April, 1874, was called by President Young to take charge of the United Order at Springdale, on the Rio Virgin. Upon the breaking up of that organization he removed to Orderville, and labored with great zeal under the direction of the authorities to the day of his death.
He was laboring as a carpenter, when he was taken with a pain in his stomach, and died at 4 p.m. the following day.
Brother Palmer married two wives, and leaves a wife and 16 children, and six grandchildren, and a large circle of friends to mourn his loss. His death was peaceful and painless, and he departed in strong hope of the resurrection and eternal life.—[Com.]

At Brigham City, on the 8th inst., of inflammation of the lungs and general debility as well as old age, JONATHAN C. WRIGHT.
Jonathan Callins Wright, son of Peter Bice and Elizabeth Wright, was born at Rome Oneida Co., N. Y., November 29th, 1808, but moved with his parents to Dearborn Co., Indiana, when six years old. When 14, upon the death of his father, he moved to Illinois. While working hard for a livelihood he struggled to obtain an education above common and succeeded well therein. On the 1st of March 1838 he was married to Miss Rebecca Wheeler, and settled in Exeter, Scott Co., where he gained much respect and influence on account of his intelligence, ability and an upright life, and held the office of a county commissioner and other subordinate offices. He was a devoted member of the Methodist Church, and was solicited by many of its members to enter the ministry, but he felt unsettled and troubled in his mind in relation to which one among the numerous conflicting sects had the only and true plan of salvation. But after he had sought the Lord in fervent prayer, he feeling strongly impressed to do so, went to Nauvoo where he met the Prophet Joseph Smith and became firmly convinced, almost at sight, that he was an inspired man of God. He received some of the Church works at the office of the Nauvoo Neighbor, where he met Elders John Taylor, W. Woodruff and Elias Smith, and stayed over night at the house of Elder Hyrum Smith. While he felt it was his duty to embrace the gospel, he started again for home, but was struck down with severe sickness as if death were upon him, and he soon found himself back in the house of Hyrum Smith. Being fully convinced that in the waters of Jordan there was healing to be found for body and soul. Brother Wright proceeded to the banks of the Mississippi in which river he was baptized by Hyrum Smith and after this ordained an elder which happened May 29, 1843, after which he returned to his home in Exeter a happy man, but he soon bade farewell to said place and dwelled among his brethren in Nauvoo, where he lived and shared with the saints in their joys, sorrows and persecutions until their exodus. After the death of Brother John P. Green he was marshal of Nauvoo, and a member of the city council at the time when the kind legislature at Springfield annulled the charter of the city. As an officer in Nauvoo and at Winter Quarters, he was vigilant, enduring, brave and fearless, and wielded a strong arm in defence of his people against mobs and tyrants. He was sent from Winter Quarters back to Nauvoo and other places, to encourage the remaining Saints to follow in the wake of the main body of the Church to a safe asylum in the Rocky Mountains. He came to Utah in 1850, to continue a long and useful career, mostly in Box Elder County, where he has lived since in 1854, and officiated as first counselor to Apostle Lorenzo Snow, in the presidency of the Stake as well as president of the High Council of the Stake. Since the first organization of the county he has held positions as Judge of Probate, Clerk, At torney, and Superintendent of Schools, and has also been an active member of the Legislature twenty-two sessions. Brother Wright was a wise counselor and a warm and firm friend to the weak and to the lowly, and a lover of righteousness and truth. His last days were days of much suffering and affliction such as are seldom witnessed in our midst but when death had put a period to his mortal woes, he appeared very pleasant, as in the enjoyment of a sweet and glorious rest. Of a

man in life so wise, so good, so eminently just and sympathetic in word and deed to the unfortunate, it may well be said, as of one of the great spirits of this dispensation long since departed:

"His loved name will never perish,
Or his memory crown the dust,
For the Saints of God will cherish
The remembrance of the just."

Bro. Wright leaves a large family and almost innumerable friends to mourn his loss.
