McCOY ON STATE BOARDS.

A marked feature of the afternoon was a well prepared paper by Dr. Clarence McCoy of this city on "The State Board of Pharmacy in its Relation to the State Pharmaceutical Association." Dr. McCoy advocated more stringent laws in regard to the class of persons to whom apprenticeship should be given to apply for apprenticeship in the dispensing and surgery, especially that they be required to possess at least a high school education before being allowed to become apprentices. He criticized the laxity which allowed the business which should be done by registered pharmacists to be done by country shop keepers, and the duty of the state board to pass a law to this, and not allow the profession to degenerate into a mere mercantile calling. The paper was very well received.

IMPROVEMENT HOPE FOR.

It is proposed that the opening of the Flathead reservation will be attended by simpler methods than those connected with the rush now on.
