He is Doctor Krishna Who is Here To Study Social and Economic Conditions.

GOES FROM HERE TO CUBA.

Says the American Preachers in India Are "Ministerial Hoboes" Who Do the Country No Good.

That it is easy to recover from the afflictions of another, so long as one is not directly influenced by the affliction, is the burden of a story of India that is brought to Salt Lake this week by Pandit Dr. N. Krishna. Dr. Krishna is here to study social and economic conditions in Utah, with emphasis on the life led by members of the dominant Church. He plans to write a series of books on his return to India pointing out wherein Hindus may profitably learn from American and European life. He will spend about three weeks in Salt Lake making a special study of local conditions, and will then go to Cuba, crossing from there to Mexico, through South America and thence home by way of Australia. Dr. Krishna has spent many years abroad. He is a scholar with degrees from European universities and has studied in Russia, England, Sweden, Denmark, and Austria. He was for four and one-half years lecturer on oriental customs before the Oriental association of St. Petersburg, and was a personal friend of Count Leo Tolstoy, of whom he is a great admirer. In Sweden he was a guest of the Liberal leader, Dr. Stellan, and in Denmark, Thomas Ashworth, G. H. Schettler, C. D. Schettler, Miss Margery Mulvey, the Imperial quartet and the Rigoletto quartet. Miss Irene White will give a recitation, and short addresses will be made by John P. Minkin, Prof. B. S. Hinkley and Elder Thomas.

HEAVY STORM DID SERIOUS DAMAGE
Accompanied by Thunder and Lightning it Caused Havoc.

CAR PASSENGERS IN A PANIC.

Trees and Windows Shattered and Houses Shaken—Streets Flooded By Water From Hillsides.

The storm of Saturday afternoon was a heavy one, attended by considerable damage. Over three-quarters of an inch of rain fell, and the same amount of water came down the hillsides east and north of the town that generally characterizes a cloudburst. The storm was accompanied by heavy thunder and lightning, which played havoc with the windows within quite a radius from Third East and Third South streets. Lightning shattered the four large windows in the grocery store of Jorgensen and Mrs. Danie. The storm was standing in the doorway watching the storm which shattered the windows and shattered the windows and covered them with glass. Fortunately they were uninjured. The same bolt broke the windows in residences in the neighborhood, also struck car 109 on Second and South streets, causing a serious panic among the passengers. The residence of A. D. Woolley at Fourth South and Third East streets was struck and shaken to its foundations. However, nothing more serious occurred than broken windows. The lightning shattered a large leaded glass pane in the window of the residence of A. D. Woolley at Fourth South and Third East streets, hurling large fragments in all directions. Window glass in that direction also was smashed in many houses and the inhabitants badly frightened. In fact the shock and force of the lightning was felt in all parts of the city, in some places sending women into hysterics.

A ROARING TORRENT.

The flood of rain started a great flow of water down the east and west benches, which played havoc with the streets for long distances. The Sixth, Third, First and South Temple street tracks of the Utah Light & Railway company were speedily covered with sand and rocks, suspending service on those thoroughfares for several hours. Three cars were hunched on Third street, stuck in the sand, the same number were stalled at First and R streets, where the roadway resembled the bed of a sizeable creek in freshet time. Four cars were together at Tenth East and South Temple, one of them, pretty near crossways with the tracks, while there was a roaring torrent rushing down the south side of the street, carrying rocks, sand and gravel with it. The street car service had several cars of men, and the emergency cars, and the two emergency cars were kept busy.

MUCH DAMAGE DONE.

The waters rushed down Military avenue 18 inches deep, sweeping through the premises of the residences in the northeast part of the town, flooding cellars, covering lawns with sand, gully sidewalks, gutting the half and garage of Jacob Moritz three feet deep, doing about \$500 damage, and the trenches of the Utah Gas & Coke company, 25 miles long, were filled with sediment and water. Fourteen hundred feet of ditching for the city sewer system was damaged. The residence of Arthur Robinson on Fifth East and South Temple, one of them, with 25 feet of liquid mud, and the east side of the street for 200 yards was flooded with three feet of water. At Main and Fifth South streets the water was six inches deep, and east of Main and South Temple, one of them, and Fifth South streets and south of there, many places were impassable, the water being two feet deep in locations. The skies did not clear up until Sunday afternoon, several smart showers occurring Sunday morning.
