**REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.**

OGDEN, Oct. 7.—The Republican city convention convened in the courtroom this morning at 10 o'clock and was called to order by temporary Chairman George H. Davis. Judge Howell was elected permanent chairman and W. D. Van Dyke permanent secretary. Committees on credentials, order of business and on resolutions were named and adjournment was made until 2 o'clock this afternoon, when nominations will be made for mayor and other city officers, to be voted for next month.

**MUNICIPAL COURT.**

A decree of divorce was granted in the district court yesterday to Alice Farmer against Lyman E. Farmer. The couple were married on April 27, 1894, and plaintiff claimed she had not been supplied by defendant with the necessities of life since May 1, 1898. The court granted plaintiff \$67.50 as costs of the action and alimony in the sum of \$25 monthly; also restored her maiden name, Alice Whitworth.
