AN ORDINANCE,

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE crection and maintenance of water closets, out-houses and privies within forty (40) feet of any street line.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah:
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect or maintain any water closet, out-house or privy within forty (40) feet of the line of any street in Salt Lake City; provided that this ordinance shall not apply to any water closet existing or to be hereafter erected or maintained in any dwelling, where the same is or shall be properly constructed, with vent pipes passing through the roof of the building, and connected with the sewer or cesspool.

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeaner, and upon conviction thereof shall he punished by a fine in any sum not less than five (5,00) dollars, nor more than one hundred (\$100,00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the City Jail for not more than three (2) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon approval.
