PROGRESS OF PRINTING .- Books and newspapers have multiplied to such an extent in our country, that it now takes 750 paper mills with 2,000 engines in constant operation, to supply the printers, who work night and day. These mills produced 270,000,000 pounds of paper last year, which immense supply sold for about \$27.-000,000. A pound and a quarter of rags are required for a pound of paper, and 340,000 000 pounds were therefore consumed in this way last year .- [Eve. Independent.


