

UGLY STORIES ABOUT DE LARA CASE

Direct Connection Said to Exist
Between His Arrest and a
Postoffice Robbery.

WAS HIS MAIL RIFLED?

Two Members of Los Angeles Police Force Accused of Serving the Mexican Government.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 21.—Various stories are being circulated today by friends of Gutierrez de Lara, the federal prisoner, to the effect that ours is an official plot against the Mexican to have him deported from the United States as an anarchist.

It is declared that there is a direct connection between De Lara's case and the robbery of the postoffice at Terminal Island, near San Pedro, Tuesday.

The significant fact in the robbery is said to be that the only mail taken was that from Mexico, including letters to friends of De Lara. The postmaster, it is said, refuses to disclose the address. Washington officials have been notified.

The Herald today says that two members of the Los Angeles police force are being openly accused of serving the Mexican government in case where political refugees have been arrested and imprisoned.

These officers, according to the newspaper, are believed to be the ones who gave information to Immigration Inspector Ridder, supervisor of the De Lara in his capacity as an attorney, and also who under the law should be directed to Mexico. One of these officers is said to have been instrumental in obtaining evidence which was used to send the alleged revolutionaries, Mazon, Villafane, and Flores to the Argentine continental for violating the federal laws.

As far as the local authorities know, the Mexican government has no desire for De Lara's return. The immigration officials say that if he can prove that his convictions as to the forms of government and his mental conduct are not objectionable, as measured by the standards applied to him, he can remain here indefinitely if he does not violate other laws.

The examination will be held as soon as the necessary papers arrive in Washington probably early next week.

THINKS THE ENGLISH AHEAD

Movement in Old Country is Progressing
Satisfactorily—Violence Accom-

New York, Oct. 20.—A quiet little group of New York women, bearing banners labeled "Votes for Women," stood on the White Star pier tonight and welcomed to America Mrs. Emmeline Gould Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes of Great Britain.
