

UGLY STORIES ABOUT DE LARA CASE

Direct Connection Said to Exist
Between His Arrest and a
Postoffice Robbery.

WAS HIS MAIL RIFLED?

Two Members of Los Angeles Police
Pure Accused of Serving the
Mexican Government.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 21.—Various
stories are being circulated today by
friends of Gutierrez de Lara, the
federal prisoner, to the effect that
there is an official plot against the
Mexican to have him deported from
the United States as an anarchist.

It is claimed that there is a direct
connection between De Lara's case and
the robbery of the postoffice at
the island, near San Pedro, Tuesday.
The significant fact in the robbery
is said to be that the only mail
bag taken from Mexico, including
letters to friends of De Lara, the
postmaster, is said, refuses to dis-
cuss the robbery. Washington officials
have been notified.

The Herald today says that two
members of the Los Angeles police
department are being openly accused of
serving the Mexican government in
returning political refugees have
been arrested and imprisoned.
These officers, according to the news-
paper, are believed to be the ones who
have information to immigration in-
vestigation, purporting to show
that De Lara is an anarchist and an
enemy of the United States.

Under the law, one of these of-
ficials, if it is said to have been
active in obtaining evidence
which was used to send the alleged
anarchist, Villareal, and
members of the Arizona penitentiary for
violating the federal neutrality laws.
As far as the local authorities know,
the Mexican government has no de-
mand for De Lara's return. The im-
migration officials say that if he can
show that his convictions are to the
advantage of the government and his
return are not objectionable,
assured by the standard applied to
any alien, he can remain here in-
definitely if he does not violate other
laws.

The examination will be held as
soon as the necessary papers arrive
from Washington probably early next
week.

It is expected today from Atty.
General Harbo of Chicago, in re-
sponse to the request of the De Lara
league that he call on to Los
Angeles to take part in the defense of
De Lara.

disapproval of women in politics.

"Let the suffragettes," she says, "ac-
quire a building, furnish it like the
house of commons, and handle for a
few years the same subjects being
dealt with by the members of parlia-
ment."
"If the women during that period
are guileless of any violent, clap-net
orations, if they endure all-night sit-
tings, and if they show themselves
wiser than the men, let them vote."

MRS. PANKHURST IN AMERICA

Purpose of Her Visit is to Speak
On Woman's Rights and
Study the Situation.

THINKS THE ENGLISH AHEAD

Movement in Old Country is Progress-
ing Satisfactorily—Violence Accom-
panies All Great Movements.

New York, Oct. 20.—A quiet little
group of New York women, bearing
badges labeled "Vote for Women,"
stood on the White Star pier to-
night and welcomed to America Mrs.
Emeline Gould Pankhurst, leader of
the militant suffragettes of Great Brit-
ain.

In accordance with the rulings of
the customs authorities, less than 20
persons were admitted on the dock and
the reception of the woman who has
served two terms of imprisonment for
her activity in the cause, was devoid of
clamor. She was hurried to the suf-
frage headquarters at 502 Fifth ave-
nue.

Mrs. Pankhurst is slight of stature
and has a wealth of brown hair, which
is just turning gray. She looked a
typical Englishwoman and was dressed
becomingly in a dress of dark material.
"I am coming to America," she said,
"to speak on the subject of equal rights
for women, and to study the situation
in this country. I think we are away
ahead of you in this matter."

As she talked, Mrs. Pankhurst dis-
played a little medallion she wore, and
explained that it was a distinguishing
mark worn by those Englishwomen who
have been imprisoned for the cause.

"I suffered solitary confinement," she
continued, "and had only one hour of
exercise out of 24. During the other 23
I was confined in a little cell, 8 by 10
feet. I had cell No. 47 on the second
floor of Holloway prison and I wore the
regular prison garb, but I did not bring
this costume to New York with me."
"The movement is progressing satis-
factorily in England," she went on.
"We have pledged from practically two-
thirds of the members of parliament to
vote for us as soon as a bill is prepared
by the government. And we expect
sooner or later to compel the govern-
ment to introduce the bill. Just when
this will come to pass I am not pre-
pared to say."

Mrs. Pankhurst stoutly defended mil-
itant tactics.

"All great movements have been
worked out by violence," she said.
"The American people secured their lib-
erty by violence, so why not rush the
house of commons to obtain what we
regard as our rights? The ballot grant-
ed to women will make them more in-
telligent, less self-centered and on the
whole much better citizens."

"Don't you think that there would be
corrupt women politicians and women
ward heisters?" Mrs. Pankhurst was
asked.

"Well," she replied, "I don't think it
could make politics any worse at any
rate."
Mrs. Pankhurst declared she had been
a suffragette as long as she could re-
member. She had gone to meetings in
favor of the emancipation of women
when she was only 14 years of age, ac-
companied by her mother, who, herself
was an ardent advocate of the cause.
Mrs. Pankhurst will remain in the
United States until Nov. 22, but will not
be able to get as far west as Colorado,
where suffrage is being tried. She will
speak in Boston Friday and Wednes-
day Saturday, returning to New York
Sunday for a reception by the National
and New York State associations.

**AMERICA MAY GET
ANOTHER CARDINAL**

Rome, Oct. 20.—While the pope only
recently seemed determined not to have
a consistory until 1910, it is now sud-
denly announced that one will be held
about the middle of December and an-
other next spring. It is added that the
reason for holding two consistories is
for the purpose of appointing as car-
dinals in the second consistory certain
prelates who cannot be included in the
first.

Strict secrecy is being maintained re-
garding the names of those whom it is
intended to elevate, but it is known
that Monsignor of Lisbon will
receive the red hat in December
and it is also considered certain that
Mr. Bisset, papal major domo, will be
elevated in the spring.

Regarding the appointment of a new
American cardinal, Archbishop Parley
of New York, Archbishop Ireland of St.
Paul, Minn., and Archbishop O'Connell
of Boston, are considered the most likely
candidates, while it is reported that
an American cardinal may be named
as a member of the curia and therefore
will live in Rome.
Others likely to receive the red hat
are the Most Rev. Francis Bourne,
archbishop of Westminster, Mr. Pal-
mer, apostolic delegate at Washing-
ton, Mr. Gaillard, secretary of the
congregation of bishops, Mr. Della
Chiusa, archbishop of Bologna, and
the archbishops of Buenos Ayres and
Florence.

**LITTLE TARIFF WAR
WITH FRANCE POSSIBLE**

Washington, Oct. 20.—Drastic mea-
sures, including the exclusion of im-
portation from any country guilty of
discriminating against this country, may
be found necessary by the president in
the event that it should be regarded as
requiring for this country to adopt re-
taliation tariff measures against
France.

While so far this government has re-
sisted to official information of the in-
formation of France to operate a maxi-
mum tariff against this country upon
the termination—on Oct. 31—of the com-
mercial agreement, officials here are
willing to admit that there is some dis-
agreement of the two countries for some time
at least of applying their maximum
rates against each other.
The exclusion power is furnished in
section 2 of the tariff act of Aug. 20,
1890. This section empowers the president
in case American goods are un-
justly discriminated against by any
country, absolutely to prohibit the im-
portation into the United States from
that country of any article he may see
fit to name.

New York, Oct. 20.—The forcible
expulsion of Belgium from the Congo is
urged on England and the United
States, in a book "The Crime of the
Congo," by Mr. Conan Doyle which
will be published simultaneously on
both sides of the Atlantic in a few
days.

Neither author nor publishers are
to make any profit on the book as all
the money realized will go to the
Congo Reform association.

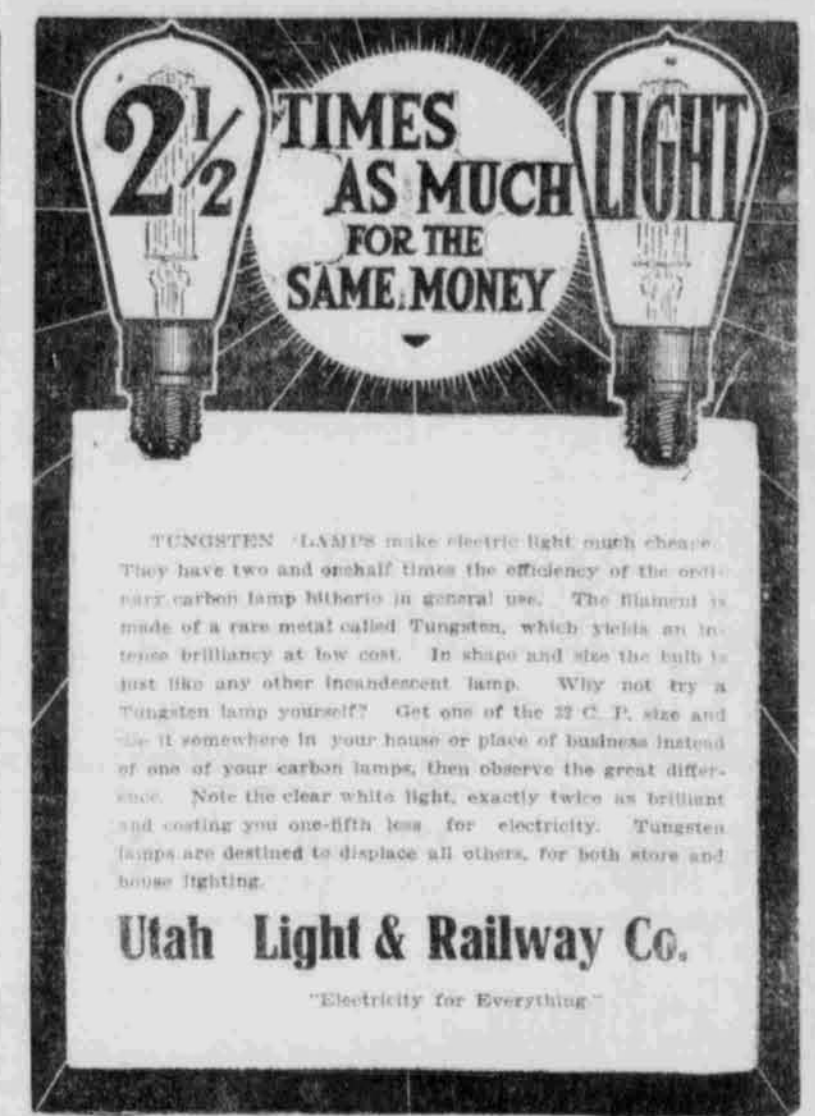
