

POPULATION OF UTAH BY COUNTIES AND MINOR CIVIL DIVISIONS.

This bulletin, prepared under the direction of Mr. William C. Hunt, chief statistician for population, gives the aggregate population of Utah by counties and minor civil divisions according to the official count of the returns of the twelfth census, taken as of June 1, 1900.
