MAKES PLANS TO RESUME.

New York, Nov. 29.-The plan for re-sumption of business by the Knicker-bocker Trust company provides that sharsholders shall raise \$2,400,000 and the stock of the company shall bo placed in the hands of a voting trust. Depositors are to be paid 30 per cent of their deposits at once in "surplus certificates," to bear interest at 4 per cet.n These certificates are to be re-tired out of surplus that may exceed \$10,000,000. Seventy per cent of the de-posits are to be represented by neso-tiable certificates are to be paid off these certificates are to be paid off every three months. The committee, of which Herbert L. Satterice, son-in-law of J. P. Morgan, is counsel, hope that the company may resume at an early date. The turther plan provides for the le-stance of surplus certificates, desig-nated as series B, which shall be given to stockholders for \$2,000,000, which they are called upon to pay into the capital. These certificates cannot be inquidated until all cretificates given to depositors have been paid off and can-celed. When the Knickerbocker Trust com-

celed. When the Knickerbocker Trust com-pany closed its doors over a month ago after a remarkable run of a little over two hours, during which frightened de-positors withdrew nearly \$12,000,000, some \$45,000,000 was still due depos-itors. Bad Time to Hamper Them With Unnecessary Legislation When Spending Millions for Improvement.

Washington, Nov. 29 .- Senator J. B. Foraker made it clearly known today that he will contest the Ohio delegation to the Republican national convention with Mr. Taft. This decision is contained in a letter to Conrad J. Mattern, vice-president of the Ohio Republican league, who forwarded to Mr. Foraker a copy of the resolutions adopted by the advisory and executive committee of the league, endorsing Mr. Foraker for the senatorship and for the presidential nomination. He defends his course in relation to the passage of the railroad rate bill and insists that the necessity of the railroads of the coun-try to spend millions of dollars an-nually in increasing their fuclities makes this a bad time to hamper the roads in any unnecessary way by leg-islation.

Senator Foraker says he is gratified by the endorsement of the committee at this time because it is a flat rebuke to the suggestion that the office of United States senator is to be supped of all the real honor attached to it by mak-ing its incumbent a more agent to reg-ister the decrees of somebody else. In the course of his letter Senator Foraker says:

In the course of his letter Senator Foraker says: "I do not want to even appear to be a candidate for two offices at the same time, and therefore forego the double honor proposed, and with hearifelt ap-preciation accept the support for the presidential candidacy which the com-mittees have so generously tendered." Continuing the letter says: "I not only stand for the broad prin-ciples involved, but also stand ready to submit to my constituents for their judgment not only my action in three instances where I am unable to agree with the president, but my entire rec-ord. I may have made mistakes, but no speech or vote or other act will be found that was not in accordance with a conscientious judgment, formed by the ald of the best light at the time attainable. "In the debates on that measure I took pains to point out that if the gov-ernment took upon itself the duty and responsibility of making rates, it would of necessity have to determine into only how much a railroad should be allowed to make, but also how much for on-eration, for extensions, for equipment and for every other itsem of necessary expenditure, all of which it is impossi-ble for a government to do successfully and satisfactorily, and that the result would inevitably be that just at the time when a rapidly increasing business for the road was making it necessary ior them to raise hundreds of millions annually for increasing their tracks, cars and general facilities, we would impair the confidence of investops in their stocks and bonds and thereby pot only make it impossible for the roads to sell the additional securities neces-sary for such purposes, but lead many of the holders of them, both at home and abroad, to dispose of what were already outstanding, and that in conse-quence the market would be so largely oversupplied that their values would when the drageing down all kinds of so-
